ANNUAL HOMELESS POINT-IN-TIME COUNT

When: Wednesday, January 29, 2020.

Why: This effort helps to obtain a snapshot census of people experiencing homelessness in Ventura County on one night in January. The count includes people who, on the night of the count, are:

- Sheltered (living in emergency shelters or transitional housing) or
- Unsheltered (staying outdoors or places not meant for habitation including vehicles, streets, parks, etc.)



What: Volunteers canvass the community in pairs and collect survey data through interviewing homeless persons. Approximately 500 volunteers needed.

Who: Volunteers must be 18 years or older and have the ability to walk distances in designated locations. A smart phone/device will be needed to download the Counting Us app for the survey. More information will be shared during the training.

LEARN ABOUT THE NEW VENTURA COUNTY ELECTION SYSTEM



Ventura County has adopted a brand new polling place voting system to aid the disabled. Each polling place will have one or two ICX machines which permit all voters, including the visually and hearing challenged, to use the touch method. The machines were purchased from Dominion, one of the three best companies in the country. The machines do not scan nor retain any information, and

cannot be hacked. Only after the voter is certain that the ballot is correctly marked, will the machine print a completed ballot that the voter then places in a secured ballot box. All ballots are taken to the elections office by poll workers to be read by new machines. The paper ballots are archived for 22 months.

The time that results are announced publicly depends on how quickly poll workers can deliver completed ballots to the elections division after the polls close, and how quickly ballots can be counted by the machines. The timing of public updates of results is still being decided. If voters mail their VBM ballots prior to the last day, results can be more quickly reported after the polls close. There are now 455,714 registered voters in the county. The top three groups are Democrats: 185,000; No Party Preference: 108,000;

Republican: 133,000 (rounded off).

Seventy percent of registered voters vote by mail now, but Ventura County will not consider joining the Voter Choice Act (becoming a total vote-by-mail county with Vote Centers open 11 days before Election Day) until 2022. There are pros and cons to consider regarding this issue. We may be interested in your research on this subject.

The names of voters remain on the master roster for 8 years if they do not exercise their right to vote. If a question arises, the voter votes on a provisional or a conditional ballot. Ballots must be verified to be counted. They will receive a letter asking to verify their signature. No voter is turned away from a polling place. Most voters will vote on paper by filling in a circle next to the candidate's name or ballot measure of their choice. If voters sign up at <u>www.ballottrax.com</u>, they will receive notices about their ballot: if it has been accepted or rejected, when it has been counted, etc.
