If you missed the Annual Meeting, you missed a good time and an outstanding presentation. Our guest speaker, Professor Kathleen Bruhn, UC Santa Barbara, Professor of Political Science and Department Chair, spoke about "Democratic Backsliding and How to Fight It."



She provided several examples of democracies in South America becoming autocracies. She spoke about the changes that took place slowly over time to put autocrats in office. Here are some thoughts and quotes from her presentation:

The populist seeks to create a political divide between himself/his party and his opposition. Polarization is an autocratic tactic common to all backsliding processes. Autocratic leaders need to justify the denial of rights to the opposition groups and fear the formation of a broad opposition coalition.

"Once in power, the populist/autocrat attempts to discredit and capture or control state institutions, especially:

- Courts
- Law enforcement agencies and the military
- Oversight agencies, including national and local electoral authorities
- Regulatory agencies, such as tax authorities
- Public media
- Sources of rents, especially oil and gas"

"Here's what we need to do to resist backsliding:

- DO engage in elections; do NOT boycott them
- DO engage in litigation; do NOT engage in radical extra-institutional protest, especially involving violence
- Do lobby, or engage in moderate, peaceful protest"

LWVVC Members Making a Difference

LWVVC member Merrill Berge, CFROG (Climate First: Replacing Oil & Gas) Board Chair, attended (June 18th) the CalGEM abandoned well capping meeting in Saticoy. CFROG coordinated questions with CAUSE, MICOP and the Sierra Club. Leading a coalition of partners, CFROG is why CalGEM visited Ventura County on a "Toxic Tour" this spring and why the agency is returning to properly plug, in this first phase, 49 abandoned wells in Ventura County.

If it wasn't for CFROG raising awareness and holding the Board of Supervisors accountable, 39 of those oil and gas wells, operated by Peak in the Oxnard Plain ag fields, could have been approved for a fracking-style cyclic steam extraction process. Left abandoned by the operator, CFROG's advocacy efforts are ensuring these wells, adjacent to Ventura County's critical Fox Canyon aquifer, have been prioritized by CalGEM for plugging and capping. This month we discussed the book "Total Garbage" by Pulitzer Prize winning author, Edward Humes. The book identifies steps that we can take to reduce waste in our daily lives and highlights individuals who have had significant impacts in reducing waste, including recycling of typically non-recyclable items, micro-gardens, induction cooktops and transportation choices. We also reviewed the status of some climate bills being considered this legislative term.

The LWVUS Climate Interest Group released a document titled "Power Talk: Electrical Energy Basics And Vocabulary For Understanding Electric Power And Climate Change." Become an Observer - Ventura County Government Meetings - including the Board of Supervisors

For those not familiar with the Observer Corps, let me introduce you. It is a means to 1) hold county supervisors, city council members, school boards, and waterboards accountable; and 2) inform our members of what is happening at various government levels across the county. We usually wear our "Observer" button and our blue league shirt. When we wear these, we are **strictly observers**, we **do not** participate in public comments. Only the LWVVC president can speak for the League. Others may speak as private citizens and in "civilian" clothes. Choose the meeting(s) that fit your schedule. Attend as often as you like. Many meetings can be observed on-line, or you could introduce a friend to LWVVC by bringing them to a public meeting! Please submit a brief report of your observations to lwvvc.info@gmail.com.

As the new League year begins on July 1^{st} , it's time to take a step back and look at where you might want to spend your time in relation to League activities. About a dozen LWVVC members attended the Board of Supervisors (BoS) meeting on Tuesday, June 18th. Several members, as private citizens, spoke in support of the Voter's Choice Act and the County Elections Office (see picture of Carol Lindberg) while county clerk-recorder, Michelle Ascension, answered questions from the BoS. The members of "Restore the Vote" want to return to in-person, election-day-only voting and are asking for a full hand count. LWVVC fully supports the Voter's Choice Act as it makes voting possible for the largest number of citizens over several days, and hand counting ballots has repeatedly been shown to be inaccurate.
