Position Review at March Membership Meeting

On March 26, the membership meeting to review the Humboldt County Civil Grand Jury System was chaired by **Claire Eyton** with assistance from **Kay Escarda** and **Byrd Lochtie**. Fourteen members participated in this ZOOM meeting. Claire explained the difference between regular juries, the Criminal Grand Jury, and the Civil Grand Jury. See the March VOTER for more details.

The guest speaker was Jim Glover, a former foreperson of the Humboldt County Civil Grand Jury and an active member of the local and California Grand Jury Association that assists with the selection and training of incoming jurors. The Civil Grand Jury operates independently of the government. Jim explained how the Civil Grand Jury works, and how difficult it is to recruit and retain people on the Jury. Budgeting and time are consistent issues that may discourage people from volunteering for the Grand Jury. Grand Jury reports from 1999 to the present are available on the Humboldt.gov website.

After Jim presented, there was a lively discussion about position changes. The position was finalized to be presented at the April Board meeting and, if approved by the Board, will be included in the Annual Meeting Kit.

News from Access Humboldt

Access Humboldt is the sponsor for this event, and is training the nonprofits through a series of Boot Camps on how to set up their pages, how to use social media and emails, and how to manage their own campaigns. It is a lot of work, but hopefully our county will raise a great deal of money for some very worthwhile causes (which is even more needed this year!) So, mark your calendar for May 29 so you can donate and maybe even win a match prize for a favorite organization. Moving Day: Access Humboldt had a 5-year lease with CR, but the college decided the building it occupies is seismically unsafe and Access Humboldt now has to be out of the CR location by the end of May!

While the staff of Access Humboldt has been working diligently to find a new home, they have been unsuccessful so far. They may need to place the servers in one spot and have the few staff members work from home until they can secure something. Ideally, they would like to purchase a building so they can truly set up a state-of-the-art location for producing programs and training local people for careers in media. But the sticking point is having a down payment. Access Humboldt can handle monthly costs to buy a building, but all possible locations so far want a \$250,000 down payment. They have been working with a wide variety of folks to try to find a champion, with naming rights, etc. But so far, efforts have fallen short.

Election News Updates

The Statewide Primary Election is June 2, 2026. The General Election is November 3, 2026.

The last day to register to vote for the June 2 primary is May 18, 2026.

The Voter Information Guide for both Humboldt County and the State will be out sometime between April 23 and May 12. Our local election office reports that they are waiting on dates from their printer to know exactly when it will be available.

Ballots will begin being mailed to every registered voter on May 4. Remember that vote-by-mail ballots must be post-marked no later than June 2, and must be received no later than June 9.

It is possible to go into a local post office on June 2 and have your ballot hand stamped by a USPS staff.

On May 5 secure drop off sites for your ballots will be available. Early **in-person** voting will be available from May 4.

For a full listing of in-person Vote Centers, and Ballot Drop Box locations across Humboldt County, please go to humboldt.gov/elections and put *2026 Primary Election Vote Center & Drop Box Locations* into the search bar.

To track your ballot, sign up at: **WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov**

On our local Humboldt ballot are two measures, A and B:

Measure A is the Resort Improvement District No. 1 for **Shelter Cove**. It seeks to add a \$60 per parcel tax in order to raise money for aging water, sewer and electrical systems.

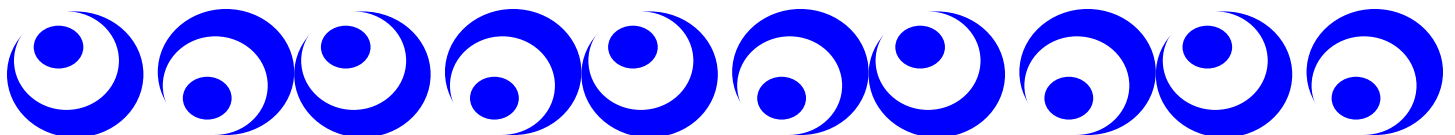
Measure B is the **Trinidad** Union Elementary School District Bond, seeking funds to repair utilities and modernize and repair restrooms and classrooms.

In the Humboldt Primary Election, a number of county wide offices and three Superior Court Judgeships are also on the ballot. However, none of the Judgeships is contested and only two of the other County-wide positions are contested. These are for Assessor and for County Supervisor-District 5.

Look for your Voter Guide in the mail. After it is published, if you prefer to go online, you will be able to find the Humboldt Voter Information Guide at: **humboldt.gov/elections**. Put *Voter Information Guide* in the search bar. If you would like to view the State of California Voter Information Guide online, you can find it at: **voterguide.sos.ca.gov**

Please make preparations now to make sure you can and will vote on June 2. Every voice and every vote counts.

A CANDIDATE FORUM

The vast majority of the local candidates on June 2 ballot are running unopposed. There are two races in which there are two candidates: County Assessor and 5th District Board of Supervisors.

Along with KEET-TV, LWVHC will be sponsoring a Candidate Forum for the two 5th District Board of Supervisors candidates on Tuesday, May 19. If you reside in the 5th District, please plan to watch the forum from 7-8 pm and CALL IN YOUR QUESTIONS!

As always, I am so grateful for the help and support of KEET-TV. This year is especially challenging for KEET-TV because of major funding cuts. For that reason, the LWVHC Board voted to provide financial support to KEET to fund the forum. Please consider donating to KEET-TV as an individual so that this vital community resource can survive.

VOTE411

The LWVC voter information resource, VOTE411, is up and running. If you'd like to see what will be on your ballot, and potentially read information submitted by candidates, go to vote411.org and enter your physical address. From there you should be able to see all the races that will be on your ballot.

Spoiler alert: As of the middle of April, many of the local and state candidates had not submitted their information or responses to questions posed by VOTE411 staff. However, I really hope that by the time this VOTER reaches your computer, many more candidates will have submitted their information.

Official Voter Information Guide from the California Secretary of State – In addition to a ballot, all registered voters will receive a Voter Information Guide from the state. ABOUT THE JUNE 2, 2026 PRIMARY ELECTION

HOW THE STATEWIDE PRIMARY ELECTION WORKS IN CALIFORNIA

In this “primary” election, voters will choose which two candidates will move on to the “general” election in November. For the following offices, you may choose any candidate on your ballot, from any political party. The two candidates with the most votes will run against each other in November. It is possible that those two candidates will be from the same political party.

There may be other local government candidates or judges on your ballot, depending on where you live. Your county elections office will mail you a County Voter Information Guide that lists everything that you can vote on. Remember, you do not have to vote on everything! Learn about the candidates and propositions that are important to you and make your choice.

OFFICES THAT REPRESENT EVERYONE IN CALIFORNIA (ELECTED FOR A FOUR-YEAR TERM)

- Governor – The highest elected official in California: Oversees most state departments and agencies. Prepares annual state budget. Approves or rejects new state laws.
- Lieutenant Governor – Next in line: Becomes Governor if the elected Governor leaves office. Has a tie-breaking vote in the State Senate. Serves on boards and commissions.
- Secretary of State – Head of elections and record keeping: Coordinates statewide elections and oversees election laws. Also keeps records about new corporations and businesses and other state databases.
- Controller – The state’s bookkeeper: Keeps track of how the state’s money is spent. Issues most checks from the state and manages collection of money due to the state. Reports on finances of state and local governments.
- Treasurer – The state’s banker: Manages the state’s investments and assets. Coordinates the sale of state bonds.
- Attorney General – The state’s top lawyer: Makes sure laws are enforced the same way across the state. Manages the state Department of Justice. Oversees sheriffs and district attorneys.
- Insurance Commissioner – Insurance overseer: Manages the state Department of Insurance. Enforces laws that insurance companies must follow.
- Superintendent of Public Instruction – Head of public schools: Manages the state Department of Education. Provides leadership and assistance to all public schools in California. Enforces education regulations.

WAYS TO VOTE

1) VOTE BY MAIL

Mark your ballot and seal it inside the envelope provided.

Follow the directions on the ballot to mark your choices.

Check that you are using the return envelope with your name on it.

Put your ballot into the envelope & seal. Only 1 ballot in each envelope.

Sign and date the envelope.

Date and sign your name carefully on the back of the envelope using ink.

MAIL YOUR BALLOT BACK EARLY! You can fill it in and mail it back as soon as you receive it.

No stamp? No problem. You do not need a stamp to mail back your ballot.

Mail your ballot back early because it must be postmarked by Election Day, June 2.

To ensure your ballot is postmarked by Election Day make sure to mail it at least five days before Election Day, June 2, 2026. If mailing on Election Day, get a manual postmark from a postal employee inside a United States Post Office.

2) DROP OFF YOUR BALLOT

If you decide to hand in your ballot instead of mailing it, you must drop it off no later than 8PM on Election Day, June 2.

Drop off your ballot at any Voting Location or secure Ballot Dropbox in your county.

3) VOTE IN PERSON

At in-person Voting Locations you can:

- Vote in person.
- Drop off your completed ballot.
- Vote with an accessible voting machine.
- Get help and voting materials in multiple languages.

Early voting, starting before Election Day, will be available in some locations.

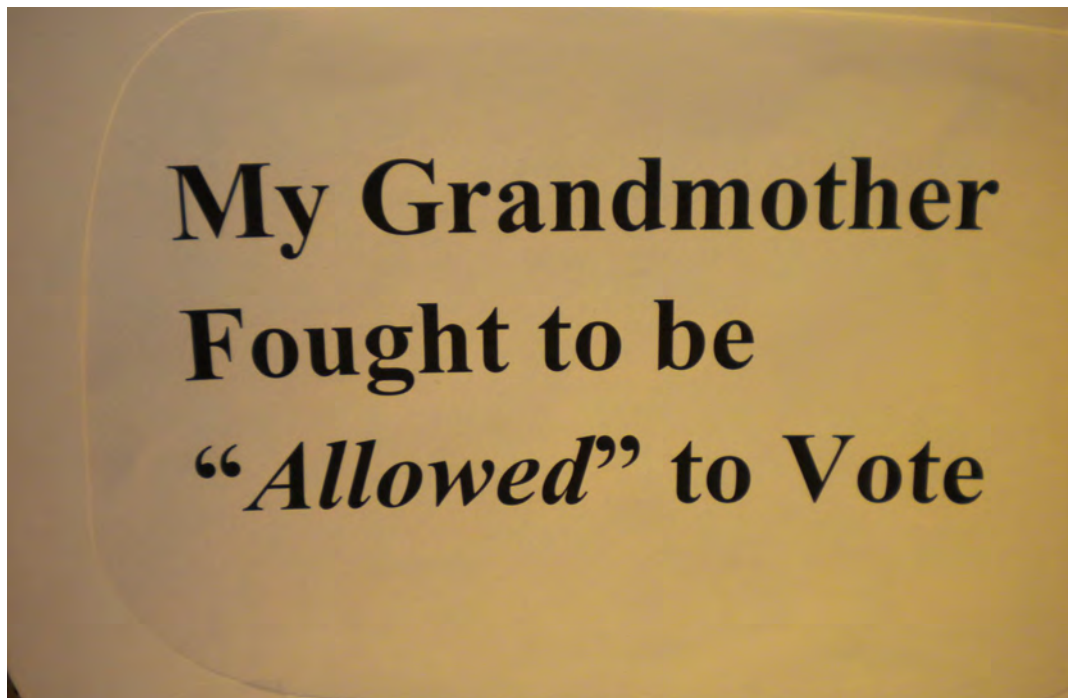

Carolyn Otis: You will be Missed!

We were filled with great sadness when we heard about the untimely death of Carolyn Otis. Carolyn was a long-time LWVHC member who took on many jobs, sometimes behind the scenes, for more than five decades. Because we know that some of our newer members may not have had a chance to work with Carolyn, we wanted to elaborate here about all she did for LWVHC.

Carolyn Otis was:

- a faithful attendee at League membership meetings, often serving as the recorder for our important consensus decisions. She was almost always on our Zoom meetings in the last few years as we continued to update our positions.
- a League Board member for multiple years and terms. Notably, she was secretary when Alice Harris (past Arcata City Manager) was president (1981-1983).
- single-handedly in charge of mailing *The VOTER* to members for decades, even when we switched to digital copies. In fact, she was the one who mailed *The VOTER* to members who still wanted printed copies. She also took charge of physically mailing the Annual Meeting Kit to all members prior to the Annual Meeting, until we also adopted the policy of digital copies.

Reminiscing about Carolyn:

Judy Bennett:

Carolyn worked on the State of the Community Luncheon Committee for many years, beginning with its inception in 1992, putting together lists and address labels for invitations. The committee met at her home for years; stuffing labels, sealing invitations, and enjoying Carolyn's warm smile and hospitality.

Carolyn also loved to go on League tours of facilities etc. around Humboldt County.

She introduced me to Peet's French roast coffee and I'll be grateful forever for that! Carolyn also collected plasticware from the 50s, and she used it!

And, of course, she and her husband Brooks were very musically inclined, hence their ownership of Wildwood Music in Arcata.

Anne Hartline:

I have so many positive memories of Carolyn Otis. I know for sure that she was on the Nominating Committee in 1991 because she was the one who convinced me to take on the role of LWVHC President! I held her responsible for that, and she was always supportive of me and my activities/challenges in the League. Carolyn gave me sage advice many times throughout my presidency, and remained a role model for me about what kindness, integrity, and humor can look like.

Byrd Lochtie:

Carolyn was a dear friend. She was one of the kindest people I have ever known. In fact, when I went to Central Office recently to tell them that Carolyn had died, the first thing they said was how very kind she always was to them.

Carolyn was dedicated to our right to vote. She worked for many years at a polling place at what was then Humboldt State University. She also worked with me for numerous years at an election precinct in Arcata. She was fun and interesting to be around, and we had good laughs when we weren't too busy at the precinct.

Carolyn was also artistic and loved jewelry made from natural materials. She was an optimist, with a spiritual belief in the goodness of the universe. I will miss her beautiful smile and her lovely laugh.

I first met Carolyn when she attended a LWV unit meeting at my house many years ago. We lived just a few blocks apart and saw each other often at League events. I even babysat her son a time or two before they moved to Arcata.
