What will be on my ballot?

- Your locality may include a sample ballot on its website.
- Ballotpedia also offers a sample ballot tool.
- Once early voting starts, Vote411 publishes a <u>nonpartisan voting guide</u> where you can learn more about each candidate.
- Local nonpartisan elections and issue referendums may appear on the ballot
- Don't forget to bring a list of who you want to vote for to the polls! You may have this list
 on your phone, but be careful not to use your phone in any way that disrupts the voting
 process or infringes on others' rights to secret ballots.

Where do I vote?

- During early voting, you can vote at <u>your local registrar</u> or any additional <u>satellite</u> <u>locations</u>
- You can find your polling location using Virginia's <u>Citizen Portal</u>
- Virginia does not offer countywide voting centers and you must vote at your assigned location
- You can contact <u>your local election office</u> for more information

Make a plan to vote!

Virginia allows approximately six weeks of early voting.

You should make a plan to vote early in-person or via an absentee ballot.

What state positions are elected in Virginia?

Virginia elects five types of state officials:

- Governor
- Lieutenant Governor
- Attorney General
- Virginia Senator
- Virginia Delegate

Virginia comprises 95 counties and 38 independent cities, together called its localities. Each locality determines the process for voter registration, where and how to vote, the ballots, and appointing general registrars and election officials.

Voting in Virginia primaries

Virginia has open primaries! This means that when you register to vote, you do not register with a specific party. Instead, you can choose to vote in either the Democrat or Republican primary when you reach the polls, which does not register you with either of these parties. You can only vote in one primary per election.

Elections in even-numbered years

- Presidential Election (next 2024)
- National Mid-Term Election (next 2024)
- U.S. Senators 6-year terms
- U.S. Representatives 2-year terms

- Governor (next 2025)
- Lieutenant Governor (next 2025)

- Soil and water directors 4-year terms
- Commonwealth's Attorney 4-year terms
- Sheriff 4-year terms
- Commissioner of Revenue 4-year terms
- Treasurer 4-year terms
- Clerk of Court 8-year terms
