Report on Official Board Actions from the Oct. 1, 2024 Meeting

Much of the Board's October 1 meeting was filled with reports on and planning for our activities related to the November 5 election. The Board also took the following "official actions":

Washington, D.C. Statehood: Board members discussed a resolution supporting statehood for the people of Washington, D.C., noting that our decision should be based on the issue of voting rights and not political or partisan concerns. It was moved, seconded, and passed with a unanimous vote that we adopt the following resolution of support:

"Therefore, be it resolved that the League of Women Voters of Humboldt County strongly supports legislation that will establish statehood for the people of the District of Columbia."

Re-adopt our Nonpartisan and DEI policies: It was moved, seconded, and passed with a unanimous vote that we re-adopt the following: DIVERSITY POLICY (Based on LWVUS with LWVHC additions: August 5, 2017; June 22, 2023):

The League of Women Voters of Humboldt County (LWVHC), in both its values and practices, affirms its belief and commitment to diversity and pluralism, which means there shall be no barriers to membership nor participation in the LWVHC on the basis of gender, race, creed, age, sexual orientation, national origin, disability, economic status, or political affiliation.

LWVHC recognizes that diverse perspectives are important and necessary for responsible and representative decision-making. LWVHC affirms its commitment to reflect the diversity of the community in its membership, Board and programs. (Updated by the LWVUS Board 1/21/2024.)

Discrimination or harassment of any kind will not be accepted within the League, including but not limited to race, socio-economic status, age, ability status, religion, sexual orientation, national origin, gender identity, or marital status.

The League is committed to fostering, cultivating, and preserving a culture of diversity, equity, inclusion, access, and belonging for all people. The League is an organization that respects and values the richness of our community and our members. Voter Service Update

By the time you receive this issue of The VOTER, the November 5 election, at least the VOTING part, will be over. No matter what the ultimate outcome, I feel proud of all LWVHC's outreach throughout our community. Here's what we accomplished:

We held a community forum for five of the seven Blue Lake City Council candidates at the Mad River Grange on September 26. It was wonderful to see 50+ community members gathered to ask lively questions of the candidates. As question sorters, **Bonnie Oliver** and I were kept quite busy sorting and rewriting questions for our moderator, **Julie Kelly**, to ask of the candidates. **Peggy Syvertson** was our expert timer, and **Sylvia Shaw**, our runner par excellence!

The following week, on 9/30 I registered 41 prospective voters at McKinleyville High. Yay! I also traveled to Fortuna on 10/2 to speak with members of the California Conservation Corps (CCC) about the importance of voting and I registered six voters there. When I polled them, I was thrilled to learn that the vast majority of the CCC members stated that they were already registered and planning to vote. I gave away numerous copies of the LWVC Pros and Cons and Easy Voter Guides brochures to assist them in their decision-making.

Finally, on Thursday of that week (10/3), **Patricia-Anne WinterSun** and I journeyed to Cal Poly Humboldt for the election trivia night. A good time was had by all, and we registered two more voters and gave out LOTS of voter information, including the Pros and Cons document, the Easy Voter Guide, and VOTE411 bookmarks.

Next, on 10/4 a candidate forum for with the candidates for Eureka City Council, Wards 2 and 4was held on KEET. Our dynamic crew included **Byrd Lochtie**, moderator; **Peggy Syvertson**, timer; **Julie Kelly** and I, question sorters; and **Mary Ann Bansen**, **Dottie Riffenburg**, and **Tracy Jordan French** answered phones.

Two days later, on 10/16, we had our second (and final) KEET candidate forum for the year, this time with the California Assembly District 2 candidates Mike Greer and Chris Rogers. Woo hoo! It was thrilling that we were able to schedule a forum with the candidates for our large CA district, since both candidates had to drive long distances to attend the forum. Both of our candidates are to be applauded for their willingness to come toEureka so that California District 2 voters could learn more about them. Our superb LWVHC crew consisted of Julie Kelly, moderator; Kathy Johanson, timer; Bonnie Oliver and I, question sorters; and Kay Escarda, Janet Foos, and Tracy Jordan French answered phones.

In addition to a HUGE THANK YOU to all our League volunteers, a huge THANK YOU is also due to Sam Greene and his expert crew at KEET-TV for making these two forums happen so smoothly and professionally. Working with Sam and KEET is always a pleasure, and I think it's really important that we acknowledge how valuable our collaboration with KEET-TV is.

The final Voter Service activity for the November 2024 Election has not yet taken place, but will be over by the time you read this article. On 10/28, I'm scheduled to speak to Arcata High School students about the California propositions. According to their teacher, Adam Pinkerton, the students have been researching the propositions and will be discussing them the week before the election. I am constantly impressed by the tireless efforts of Humboldt County educators to prepare their students to be active and informed voters! Thank you, teachers!

Whew! It's been a whirlwind, and I am so grateful to the MANY dedicated Leaguers who stepped up to register and educate voters this election season. As I stated at the beginning of this article, I am so proud of what we do as an organization to inform and motivate voters. We should all be very proud of who we are: the League of Women Voters of Humboldt County! We help make democracy work!

On Saturday, October 5, 2024, **Mary Ann Bansen** and **Dottie Riffenburg** met me at 9:30 a.m. for their twohour shift at the Wiyot Community Center to monitor the Wiyot Tribal Election. Gary Markussen, Jr., who is in charge of the election process for the tribe, had already set up the polling booths, which they now own! There was a table for us where we would welcome voters, a roster for voters to sign, ballots and a ballot box, which was also provided for us. Most of the votes were mailed in so we checked off the numbers received with the names on the roster.

Kim McCullough arrived at 11:30 a.m. and **Janine Randall** came for her shift after picking up the mail in our Election P.O. Box in Eureka. At 1 p.m. the three of us opened the mail-in ballots, counted all the ballots, filled out the report forms for the Tribe, and cleaned up.

This was a typical day at a Wiyot Tribal Election. If this sounds like something you would like to volunteer to do for the League, watch for an email requesting help in April 2025! We will be signing a new Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Wiyot Tribe for their elections in April and October in both 2025 and 2026. It's always a fun way to spend some time with fellow Leaguers and earn a bit of money for our treasury. I look forward to signing you up!
