



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# **September Meeting**

September's meeting featured a panel of Matt Saltzman, Eleanor Hare, and Holley Ulbrich talking about election issues. Matt and Eleanor talked about redistricting as we look ahead to the 2020 Census but also a possible local redistricting in Pickens County if they go ahead with a seventh seat on both county council and school board. Matt demonstrated some of the dirty tricks that can be played to minimize the influence of the minority party and/or ethnic or racial minorities. Holley described some of the issues in the caucus and primary system (winner take all, too long a primary season, low attendance at caucuses, different rules in different states, super delegates and stranded delegates) and offered suggestions for reform. Both Matt and Holley had powerpoints that they will send to you on request.

# Voting We Can Trust 3: The Illusory Recount

Before the widespread use of digital computers, we cast our votes on hand-marked and hand-counted paper ballots. The meaning of recount was unambiguous. Both counting and recounting were done by people. Now that computers have replaced hand counting, we need to reevaluate procedures used to count and recount the vote.

"Recounting" the Votes on South Carolina's Voting Machines. What does "recount" mean when there are no ballots to recount? Care must be taken to use the best available method of detecting errors in the original count.

Although South Carolina's voting machines do not use tangible ballots, copies of the ballot information and the number of times that votes were cast exist in electronic data, stored in the memory chips of each voting machine. A post-election audit compares information in the electronic files and ensures that all the votes have been collected by the poll workers. Since there are no physical ballots to recount, the post-election audit would be a good choice to "recount" the ballot. The State Elections Commission currently conducts post-election audits, but the results may not be available before the results are certified.

**Paper Ballots.** The purpose of a recount is to check for a possible error in the original count. Scanning the ballots a second time is unlikely to accomplish that goal.

In South Carolina, provisional, failsafe, emergency, and absentee paper ballots are hand-marked. Hand-marked ballots have always involved ambiguity. Not all voters follow instructions. Some have been known to circle the candidate's name, scratch out all names except one, or indicate their choice in some other unanticipated manner.

Scanners recognize only the carefully filled in boxes that voters are intended to mark and may not detect the intent of voters who do not follow instructions. Because scanners are computers and computers are consistent, if the same ballots are rescanned the totals are unlikely to change.

When it is necessary to recount a small number of paper ballots, a hand count may be the best choice.

**The Future.** When voting technology changes, the procedures used to recount must be reexamined. New vulnerabilities, introduced when scanners are used to count the vote, require additional confirmation of results.

When South Carolina replaces its aging voting machines, it will almost certainly change to paper ballots, counted by scanners. A count of such a large number of ballots by hand would be ridiculous (and very likely inaccurate).

Scanners are computers. In addition to the well-known vulnerabilities of computers, such as hacking and incorrect programming, scanners are subject to miscalibration. Even when results are not close, procedures to confirm that paper ballots have been scanned correctly should be used in every election.

Some experts have proposed assuring the correctness of the results by scanning all ballots a second time, using a different scanning system. Another suggestion uses statistical methods and a random selection of ballots. One manufacturer uses a combination scanner and ballot box, which reads the ballot back to the voter. If the voter accepts the scan, the ballot is accepted, counted, and dropped into the ballot box.

No voting technology is invincible. New technologies pose new challenges, but a wise choice of procedures can minimize the vulnerabilities of any technology.

## **Observer Corps**

### Seneca City Council meeting

The September 13, 2016, was called to order and minutes from August 9<sup>th</sup> meeting and special called meeting on August 29th were approved. Mayor Dan Alexander presented a special plaque and certificate to representatives from the Oconee Chapter of the Daughters of the Revolution in recognition of Constitution Week. Denise Rozman presented the city with two Centennial Souvenir books donated by Lucy and Henry Barnett.

John Gardner spoke to council concerning violations of the SC Codes by an individual in the city who was selling mopeds illegally. He stated when he reported it to the police they said it was a building violation and they were not responsible. The Council took his presentation as information only.

Sandra Gray spoke as a representative of the Keep Kellett Green Adams Subdivision Committee. The presentation was in response to the city's proposal to sell approximately 4 acres of the Kellett Elementary School property and conversion of the existing school building into an assisted living facility. This proposal was overwhelmingly rejected by the Adams subdivision as they wanted keep the existing 12 acres intact as a green space for the community. Several alternate ideas for the property were presented by the committee which endorsed the previous plan to convert the building into a museum, including a toy and children museums.

Other business included motions to pay the city's bills, a motion to rezone property on Wells Highway from R20 to Highway Commercial, a motion to reword portions of the Zoning Ordinances and another to renew leases on equipment. The most notable motion was the creation of a nonprofit group called the Seneca Improvement Corporation which will allow the Mayor to sign "necessary documents". Another motion transferred \$200,000 from the Light and Water Fund to the new Seneca Improvement Corporation for economic development.

Other motions included contract for \$10,000 with Palmetto Magazine for advertising. A motion was presented to help Seneca River Association preserve an original log cabin library in the City. Another motion was approval to replace/repair air conditioning at Gignilliat Park.

The Council entered into executive session for approximately 20 minutes and then returned to the Chambers and dismissed.
