Vote Humboldt - Humboldt Youth Voter Registration Project

At the August LVWHC board meeting, approval was given for our organization to partner with the above entity.

VOTE HUMBOLDT - HUMBOLDT YOUTH VOTER REGISTRATION PROJECT is affiliated with the Coalition for Nonpartisan Voter Registration (CNVR) initiated by recently deceased California Supreme Court Justice Cruz Reynoso (retired). CNVR is under California High School Voter Registration, which is a state elections program -- https://www.sos.ca.gov/elections/high-school-programs).

The objectives of Vote Humboldt are to promote civic engagement and increase voter registration among high school students. This project wants the students to teach their peers about voter registration. This project is like minded with the LWVHC because of its emphasis on non-partisan voter registration.

The committee consists of four members who are currently formulating its basic plan. A goal is to reach **every** high school in Humboldt County. Its teaching format will be based on that of the Right Question Institute -- a Catalyst for Micro-democracy, which is an organization with teaching tools. Vote Humboldt website is under development and will be shared with LWVHC.

To implement its project, Vote Humboldt will need many volunteers such as members of LWVHC. Members of Vote Humboldt highly respect the LWVHC for its active participation in non-partisan voter education and civic engagement. Community Leaders Working Together to Register Young Voters. A Nonpartisan Voter Registration Project

Youth Voter Registration in California

Community leaders are working together to promote civic engagement and increase voter registration among young people. California citizens aged 16 and 17 can preregister to vote. If preregistered, they become registered voters on their 18th birthday.

What is the Youth Voter Registration Project?

The project mobilizes youth and young adults, including high school students, to help preregister/register their peers. Our adult volunteers work with young people to register them to vote and promote civic engagement. We also train them to preregister or register their friends and classmates. We work in partnership with local high schools/school districts and civic groups. Our goal is to reach all interested and eligible youth/young adults in Humboldt County. How does the Project Work?

Humboldt volunteers contact local public and private high school administration/staff to set-up a meeting to explain the project. Our approach is flexible. Each school can establish a voter registration drive to fit their school structure. For example, registration can be conducted as part of a student government or civics class or as a stand-alone student community service project.

We help youth volunteers learn how the registration process works and how to facilitate voting discussion groups. We also provide voter education materials. Student volunteers receive support in the form of coaching and feedback. We help ensure that registrations are complete prior to submission. Our project engages in a similar process when partnering with local civic and community groups.

Youth Voter Projects are Taking Place in Other California Counties This project is affiliated with the Coalition for Nonpartisan Voter Registration initiated by recently deceased California Supreme Court Justice Cruz Reynoso (retired). Registration drives have taken place in Sacramento, Sonoma, Tulare and Yolo and other counties. For example, in Sacramento County, the Coalition for Nonpartisan Voter Registration received school board approval to register over 5,100 high schoolers in the Elk Grove Unified School District and over 2,200 high school students in the Sacramento Unified School District. The Yolo County Board of Education scheduled all county high schools for nonpartisan voter registration and provided voter education in senior classes. This resulted in an impressive 95% of the 2,100 high school seniors in Yolo County becoming registered voters.

I worked in early intervention for fifteen years supporting children age birth to three with special needs and their families. July 2021, I started a new position with Humboldt County Office of Education as the first Equity and Inclusion Learning Specialist. I have been the President of the Eureka NAACP since 2018. I completed the TK-12 Humboldt Del Norte Equity Partnership Training in 2018. I co-facilitate an eight-hour session for educators on implicit bias and the four dimensions of racism. I serve as a founding member of B-Black/ Building Black Community. I am a community support for the All-Humboldt Black Student Union. I created a format for Listening Sessions that centers the experiences of BIPOC students and families and allows high school administrators and teachers to listen and express gratitude. The sessions are the foundation for local high schools' equity work.

a timely manner as specified in the Bear River Constitution.

On August 21, 2021, the volunteers, who, with me, make up the actual Election Board, will meet with me at the Bear River Tish Non Community Center to check for valid signatures on all ballot envelopes, open the envelopes of all valid ballots, count the votes, and report the results in a notice posted at the Center. Working with me will be **Judy Stoffer**,

Carol Masterson and Janine Randall with Peg Gardner standing by in case we need her! Thank you all!

Board Member Dr. Amy Moffat

Dr. Amy Moffat moved to Humboldt County in the fall of 2019 and was looking for a way to connect with the community. She immediately got roped into participating on the committee to educate community members impartially about the pros/cons of the California ballot measures (Thank you **Nancy Kay!**).

Amy has a PhD in the social sciences from the University of California, Merced, a masters degree in applied anthropology from the University of Maryland, and a bachelor's degree in economics and management from Beloit College, Wisconsin. Her research was on doulas as entrepreneurs, women's work, gendered notions of caregiving, and how emotional support during birth statistically reduces the c-section rate. She currently works as an administrator at HSU and is the Associate Director of Institutional Assessment.

Amy lives in Arcata with her husband, Greg Cornelison, a high school teacher at Arcata HS, and two cats; her son, Brendan Chambers, is a junior at Beloit College (third generation of going to the same college).



Another Great Talk with Senator McGuire

On July 29, **Sharolyn Hutton** and I joined representatives from the Mendocino County League to once again converse with State Senator Mike McGuire.

As always, it was a productive and enlightening conversation. Senator McGuire chiefly spoke about drought relief and fire prevention efforts, along with school funding.

The state budget was approved with large increases in school funding: \$21,000 per K-12 student (a 3x increase), \$340 million for Humboldt State University to become the state's third polytechnic university, \$3 million for HSU's nursing program, and increases in special education funding and career training funding. It's the largest education budget passed in fifty years, and Senator McGuire was glad that it had passed.

In regard to drought relief, the state has a \$4 billion relief plan rolling out shortly. It will focus on agriculture, recycled water, and repairing existing infrastructure.

For fire prevention, the state has acquired 1,200 new seasonal firefighters, along with allocated \$380 million for wildfire prevention projects, in addition to purchasing numerous Blackhawk helicopters to station throughout the state for fire response.

Senator McGuire also spoke about the push to get broadband to the most underserved households in the state, many of which are located in the North Coast. A portion of the federal stimulus will be invested in high-speed internet, which will be routed alongside highways and existing encroachments.

He also reported that SB-2, SB-300, and SB-262 are steadily moving through the state government.

As always, we enjoyed the informative discussion with Senator McGuire and appreciate his enthusiasm for speaking with the League of Women Voters.
