The LWVHC Will Present Pros and Cons



At an OLLI Brown Bag Lunch (via Zoom) Monday, October 3, 2022, the LWVHC will present the "pros and cons" of each of the seven statewide ballot measures listed on the November 8, 2022, ballot. The presentation will be held for OLLI. (OLLI is the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute, which is through the College of Extended Education and Global Engagement at Cal Poly Humboldt.)

The presentation will be held via Zoom, and those who wish to attend can register for the presentation up to 11:00 a.m. on the day of the presentation, October 3, at https://extended.humboldt.edu/olli/register. (Or just search for "OLLI Humboldt.) You will need the Zoom meeting link provided by registering to attend. The presentation will begin promptly at noon and last about an hour, with time for questions.

The seven statewide ballot measures are summarized below:

Proposition 1: Constitutional Right to Reproductive Freedom. Legislative Constitutional Amendment.

Proposition 26: Allows In-Person Roulette, Dice Games, Sports Wagering on Tribal Lands. Initiative Constitutional Amendment and Statute.

Proposition 27: Allows Online and Mobile Sports Wagering Outside Tribal Lands. Initiative Constitutional Amendment and Statute.

Proposition 28: Provides Additional Funding for Arts and Music Education in Public Schools. Initiative Statute.

Proposition 29: Requires On-Site Licensed Medical Professional at Kidney Dialysis Clinics and Establishes Other State Requirements. Initiative Statute.

Proposition 30: Provides Funding for Programs to Reduce Air Pollution and Prevent Wildfires by Increasing Tax on Personal Income Over \$2 Million. Initiative Statute.

Proposition 31: Referendum On 2020 Law That Would Prohibit the Retail Sale of Certain Flavored Tobacco Products.

Behavioral Health Services Study Update

The behavioral health services study committee has met twice so far in August (we are meeting every two weeks now).

Few committee members were able to attend our August 3 meeting, to be expected this time of year. We held a 40-minute meeting, mostly to talk about reorganizing our research resources into the categories that will be the topics of a series of three membership meetings in fall 2022 and winter 2023. These membership meetings will seek consensus on the wording of what will ultimately become our behavioral health services position.

The position we create will, in turn, form the basis for actions we take on behavioral health services in Humboldt County. Our categories are derived from the scope of our study, as approved by the LWVHC board nearly a year ago. These are: prevention, diagnosis, treatment, availability. The first three categories are the meeting topics while "availability" will be discussed in every meeting. Committee members broke into small teams to begin to glean data and concepts relevant to their team category. From this information we will form open-ended yet focused questions to spark discussion at the three membership meetings. But the LWVHC board must approve the questions first.

At our August 17 meeting, we drafted a set of proposed questions on the "diagnosis" category, the first set of questions we have created. It felt very good to have started on this next phase of the study. We hope to present potential questions on "diagnosis" and on "treatment" to the LWVHC board at their September 6 meeting and the rest of the questions at their October board meeting.

The behavioral health services study committee will meet from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Wednesday, August 31, September 14, and September 28. Members are welcome to attend our Zoom meetings.


