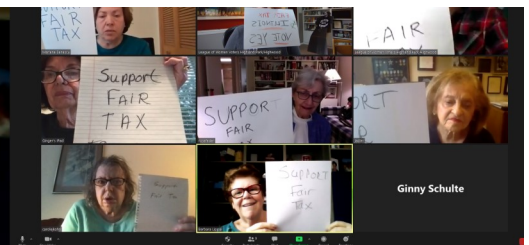
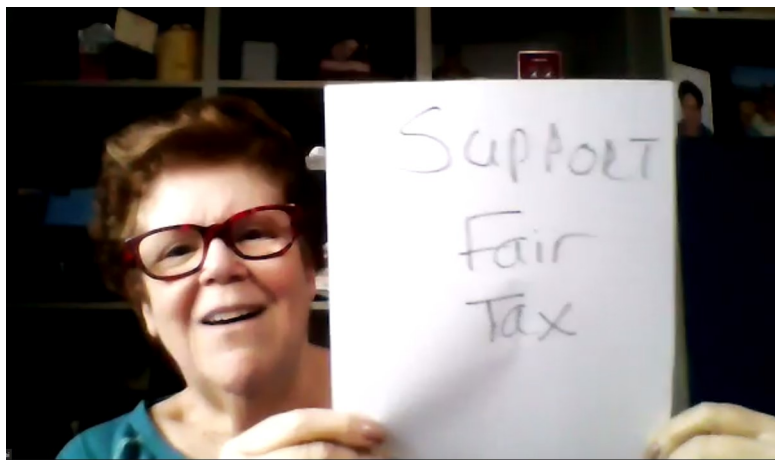

Sheltered at the Bob Robinson Bandstand, we paused at 3 PM to honor those who gave their lives in service to our country. I also thought of those healthcare workers, never expecting to put their own lives on the line, who were infected with the virus and did not survive.

Besides the worsening COVID-19 statistics, every day seems to bring a new or escalating crisis somewhere in the world, and, in the case of the environment, everywhere in the world. As individuals, we can distract ourselves by turning to novels or Netflix... and we all need some of that. But, I would also like to suggest – that what we choose to do during these difficult times can also be a reflection of who we really are. We can choose to get closer to our family members with frequent Facetime and Zoom visits, cook and bake for our friends, donate our resources to those in need and, of course, help our wonderful HP/HWD Leaguers make a difference. - Monitor delayed Census Progress as LWVIL may ask for our help.
- Join a committee to advocate for the Fair Tax Amendment.

The 2020 LWV National Convention will begin on June 25. Nancy Goldberg, Marlene Senescu and I will virtually connect with hundreds of delegates from all over the country to celebrate the League's Centennial and decide on program and advocacy for the next two years. Some of the caucuses already scheduled are: Civics Education; Cybersecurity & Privacy; Voter Representation/Voter Systems; Climate Emergency – Time for All Hands on Deck; America's Choices in the Health Care Debate; Rebuilding Trust to Save our Civil Society; National Popular Vote and more. There may be opportunities for non-delegates to observe the plenaries and caucuses.

As always, I welcome your comments, suggestions and questions. I hope to "see" you at our annual meeting.

## *Bylaws Changes for 2020-2021*

Membership qualification will be amended to conform with the Bylaws of LWVUS as follows:

- Replace “Citizens at least 16 years of age” **with** “Persons at least 16 years of age”.
- Replace “Those who make a lump-sum life membership payment to the LWVUS shall be paid life members and those who have been members of the League for fifty (50) years or more shall be honorary life members, and are excused from payment of dues.” **with** “Those who have been members of the League for fifty (50) years or more shall be honorary life members, and are excused from payment of dues.”

# Stroll to the Polls

A great example of LWVIL Leagues sharing and growing together. LWV Highland Park/Highwood completed its first “Stroll to the Polls 2020” with Highland Park High School as Students Go Door-To-Door to Increase Voter Turnout. The LWVHP/HWD “Stroll to the Polls”, team was led by Shoshana Friedman, coordinator; with Judy Miller and Nancy Goldberg as co-chairs.

“Stroll to the Polls” on Sunday morning, March 8 was a great success! A year in the planning, the program involved the League of Women Voters of Highland Park/Highwood and the Social Studies Department of Highland Park High School (HPS) preparing students for this first-time voter education project. More than 100 enthusiastic HPS students from Civics classes gathered at the High School to kick off the Stroll, with hot chocolate and donuts, to hear about the importance of voting from featured speakers: HPS Social Studies teachers Joe Brysiewicz and Deborah Linder; League coordinator of the event, Shoshana Friedman; Highwood Mayor Charlie Pecaro; Highland Park Councilman Tony Blumberg, and two student speakers. Thirty plus volunteers from the League (including volunteers from Arlington Heights area), Grand Times (a local intergenerational program) and the teaching staff of HPS and their spouses were there to register, organize the students into teams and hand out packets of materials

Pending school attendance decisions, we have tentative plans for a next “Stroll” on October 4th.

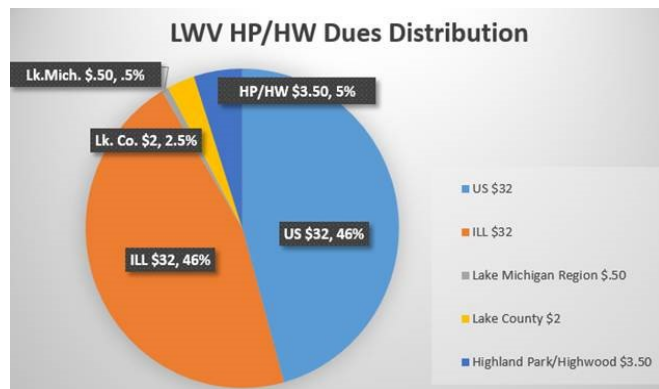
### Remembering Dan Pierce

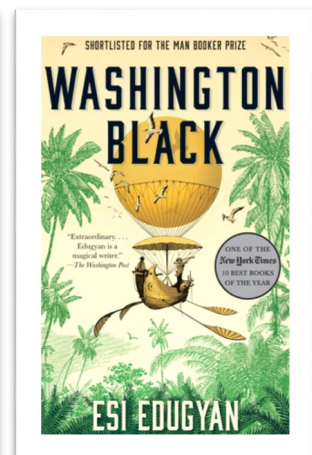
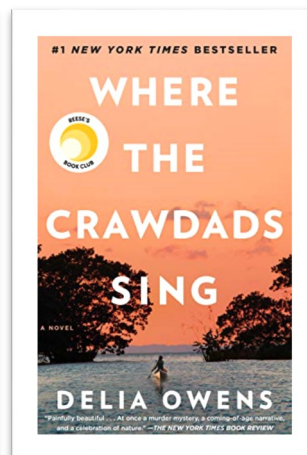
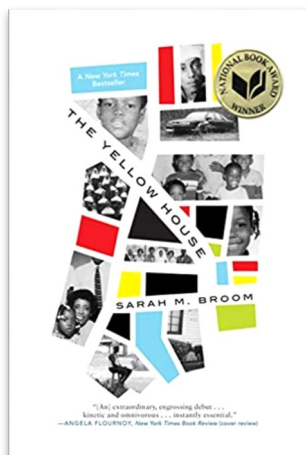
The following day, the Library determined to close and the remaining sessions will be rescheduled, hopefully sometime in the Fall.

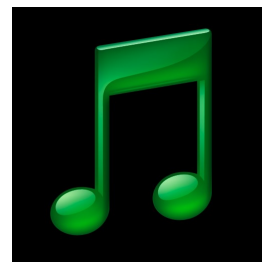

## GREEN NOTES DURING COVID-19



The pandemic quarantine has freed up some time, and given pause to re-evaluate an ongoing process that is being experienced “in spades” right now for so many reasons.

While our minds are focused on staying healthy and adhering to new rules, we know there are so many other vital issues that must be attended to. There really are so many ways we can participate in a resistance to climate change and environmental degradation from the comfort of our own homes.

**PLASTICS:** 22 million pounds of plastics enter the Great Lakes each year with Lake Michigan receiving the most. Take an inventory of your single use plastics at home and try to reduce. Look around your kitchen and think about what plastics can be easily eliminated. When you bring food in from a restaurant, mention that you would prefer reusable, reheatable and easily recyclable food containers. Be sure to say “I don’t want a plastic bag.” You are the customer, and what you want matters.

**FOOD WASTE:** The third biggest contributor to climate change is food waste. One quarter of what we waste could solve hunger around the world. Fewer trips to the grocery store require more menu planning, but it’s a helpful way to avoid over-buying and food waste. Experts will attest that expiration codes are extremely misleading and we should pay more attention to taste and smell, not dates! Information on dates and codes is easily available. These actions will not only save money for your family, they will positively impact climate change by reducing fossil fuel use.

**FOOD COMPOSTING:** Right now 90% of food waste ends up in landfill and is a huge contributor to methane gas. Composting helps tremendously in the reduction, and you can create your own compost pile, or, subscribe to the curbside composting service offered by Lakeshore Recycling Systems.

**LESS PAPER:** Consider using less paper towels and napkins. Cloth is a great substitute and once you get in the habit, it will feel so much better. At the same time look at the paper products you are buying. Imagine old growth trees being cut down for toilet paper! Look for post consumer waste products or those that say from 100% recycled material.

**GARDENING:** This stay at home time offers more possibilities for gardening. Things to consider avoiding that will help the environment:

- No toxic products like Round Up are used
- No artificially colored mulch...stick to natural pine bark or your own leaf mulch. Coco shells are good too and smell yummy.
- Grow some food. Lettuce is a great start and can even be done in a pot. It’s amazing to see what a few seeds can produce.
- Plant native species and you’ll save time and water. Add a rain barrel and you will always have rain water which is so much better for growing things. (higher oxygen content).

Reducing waste can be a challenging and rewarding activity that will pay back more than you invest!
