Keynote Speaker: Hon. Barbara Flynn Currie

Majority Leader of the Illinois House of Representatives

Barbara Flynn Currie is the first woman Majority Leader of the Illinois House of Representatives.

First elected to the Illinois House in 1978, Ms. Currie represents the 25th District in Chicago, which includes parts of the communities of South Chicago, South Shore, Woodlawn, Hyde Park and Kenwood. Her legislative accomplishments include sponsorship of the first Illinois Freedom of Information Act and universal pre-school.

Ms. Currie graduated with honors from the University of Chicago and went on to earn a Master's degree in political science. She is a longtime member of the League of Women Voters and on the board of the ACLU of Illinois. Ms. Currie is active in many civic, community and environmental organizations and has been honored by many organizations, including being the recipient of the Illinois Environmental Council's Lifetime Achievement Award.

LOCAL PROGRAM FOR CONSIDERATION:

The following local program planning suggestions have been received. They are presented in the order in which the topics appear in the position papers. Please review these ideas. The Leadership Team will put forth its recommendations at the annual business meeting at which time those present will approve a local program for 2018-19.

City Planning

General: Since design review is now part of the Plan Commission responsibilities, consider integrating measurable criteria of design.

Neighborhood Character: Consider support for preserving the character of single-family residential neighborhoods through the use of traditional zoning techniques. Regulation should be of measurable criteria not subjective matters of taste such as a design review process. Consider support for maintaining a range of housing prices in the community, which should be considered whenever changes in zoning district regulations are proposed.

Transportation and Roads: Consider support for the concept of designating roads as a means of planning and promoting unity and better access in Highland Park.

Environmental Preservation

Consider the addition of climate change to the environmental section. This could include a position favoring the use of renewable energy in our municipalities and by residents which would be especially pertinent in guiding the choice of provider/energy mix if the City enters into a municipal aggregation contract.

Handguns

Include in this position, the city's ban on assault weapons.

Library

Consider addressing changes that may come up with regard to the Library and Community Center remodeling.

Ravinia Festival


Conduct a study of the Ravinia Festival as to who provides the police; who provides security; does Highland Park benefit or lose revenue?; what is the current contract with Highland Park?; etc.

Schools

School Referenda Criteria: Consider including established criteria that are related to children's health and the importance of children being able to walk or bike to school.

Township Government

Consider updating the township guidelines.





Our LEAGUE'S HISTORY Exhibition is in the lobby of First Bank of Highland Park

When a person turns 90, there is often a birthday party. What do you do to celebrate an organization, run by hundreds of volunteers, that turns 90? This milestone is the perfect time to reminisce and capture the identity of our beloved League (and also have a party!). In the past, many documents from the League's early history had already been donated to the Highland Park Historical Society. But what about the remaining programs, presentations, minutes, publicity flyers, bulletins and newspaper clippings that might be sitting in the basements or drawers of all the League mem-



bers over the years? League members responded to a call for donations of these records, documenting our history since 1928. They are already at the Highland Park Library where the Highland Park Historical Society Archives and Research Center is located.

First Bank of Highland Park had agreed to use their marquee to announce the 90th anniversary celebration of our League on May 19. We were delighted when they additionally invited us to mount an exhibition of the League's history on the **Ruth Fell Wander Memorial Community Art Wall** at the bank for the month of April.

Nancy Goldberg and I identified some of programs the League has worked on over the years and dedicated portions of the 21-foot wide display to topics such as Education, Local Government, Gun Control, Environment/Land Use and Voter Rights. We also decided to highlight the inception of the League and Ruthie Wander's tenure as president of the League in the '70's. League brochures are available to take home and there is a "mini" voting booth for the younger visitors. A friend of Nancy's, Janet Krehbiel Pieracci, architect and gifted artist, designed several banners (which will be used at other events) and drew up detail specifications for the wall.

Carole Kohn and I were responsible for finding appropriate materials to meet our selection criteria. At the library, both of us reviewed the contents of archive boxes: yellowed minutes of board meetings beginning in 1930, observer reports, annual meeting programs, newspaper clippings, surveys, unit presentations and some, mostly recent photographs. We were anxious to see how the League was portrayed in the local press. In order to do that, Carole went though indices of the Highland Park News and its predecessors and then spent many hours viewing these publications on microfilm. Some of our fascinating "finds", along with many other important memories, can be seen on the Wall in the lobby of at the bank through April 26.

The bank hosted a "photo op" reception for our exhibition on April 3. While it is up, the bank will donate \$2 to the League for anyone who likes The First Bank of Highland Park on their Facebook Page (click here).

On Wednesday, March 21st, **Joann Brooks** and **Sonja Martin** captured the attention of Leaguers as they related their experiences in the military. They both served while also wives and mothers who were deployed outside of the U.S. Their tours of duty included Germany, South Korea and Iraq.

Joann enlisted into the Women's Army Corps (WAC), served twenty-one years in active duty and was a Warrant Officer, Computer Specialist and Commander.

Sonja served in the Regular Army twenty years as a Quartermaster where she had to procure the necessities for the men who were part of her Convoy. An interesting note: she had to select the clothing and other items for the captured Saddam Hussein in 2003.

Joann's and Sonja's successful exploits were achieved alongside the men that they commanded.

The League audience saw the charm, strength and pride of these American military women who were delighted to share their experiences.

VOTER REGISTRATION EVENTS


In January, League representatives registered 156 enthusiastic HPHS high school students as new voters.
