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The mission of the League of Women Voters is to encourage informed and active participation in government and to influence public policy through education and advocacy.

Our Annual Meeting was a great success. We have more in attendance that we have had in several years. Almost half of our members were able to attend. Thank you so much to all of you.

Our Business Meeting went smoothly and we covered a lot of important topics. We made a modest increase to our Membership Dues which will go into effect on June 1 and approved our Budget for next year. Our Board introduced the merge of our two financial accounts, operating 501 c 4 and Education Fund, 501 c 3 into a fully integrated 501 c 3 status. That means all payments made to the local League will now be tax deductible. The process was approved at our LWVTC March Board Meeting and at LWV-TX Annual Convention, so we are well on our way. State will handle all of the legalities of this migration and will notify us when it has been completed. The approval will be retroactive, so that means that any funds received will be considered tax deductible as of the date of our application, which was in mid-April. Reed Bilz gave a brief explanation of our Local Program and introduced an addition to that Program which was approved by membership. Thanks to Reed for taking the time to share her knowledge and to help us better understand. We also elected our new slate of officer for the upcoming year. As you can see, we still need Board Members to fill the positions of VP-Organization and VP-Program. Until these positions are filled, the Board will assume responsibility for completing the duties of those positions. If you feel you would like to give one of these a try, please let us know. You won't have to do it on your own, our Board will have your back.

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President's Message 2018



I think we can all agree that this year has flown by! It seems like just yesterday that I was standing in this same spot giving you the President's Report for 2016 – 2017. This year, as President, I have been able to work with all the wonderful members of the Board of Directors and the indispensable Doris. Thank you all for doing what you do to make this organization happen. Without your support, encouragement and guidance, I, and the League, would have been lost.

As many of you know, this year was a busy one in terms of voting. In 2017 and 2018, the League worked tirelessly in and around Tarrant County to energize voters by producing our Voters Guide. Voter information and education is critical, if democracy is going to work. Tarrant County voter turnout is abysmal, but citizens must be encouraged to participate and study the issues in all contested races. As you already know, our Voters Guide is the go-to source for fair, trusted, and balanced information in a world that is typically clouded by sensationalism and political extremes. It is the easiest way for potential voters to educate themselves before they head to the ballot box, so that everyone can be confident they are making the best decision possible for their communities and their families. This year, our Voters Guides had tremendous response. I had several people tell me how great they looked. Thank you to Doris, Erin, Margaret, and everyone who worked on it!

We also moderated candidates forums — many of them. I have heard from many of those communities who hosted forums. They are grateful to the League and our members for helping citizens take control of the political process. The forums allowed everyday people to ask candidates to address the issues that matter most in their communities. They moved past political rhetoric and mudslinging. As we all know, this is tremendous. Thank you to everyone who made those happen.

This year we focused on connecting with members and broadening our base. We had a very successful Hot Topics lunch with Dr. Scribner, FWISD superintendent. As always, thank you, Carol, for planning these wonderful events. I would also like to recognize Leslee, who was instrumental in helping to plan many of our informal gatherings like the recent event at the T&P Tavern. Events like those give us the opportunity for informal fellowship and really remind us that being a League member is fun.

We also were visible in the community with numerous talks, presentations, and other events. Margaret worked with a group of eager, active citizens in Southlake to talk about the importance of voting. Many participants were discovering the League for the first time, and we are grateful to Margaret for helping us spread the word.

Also, many of our members took time out of their busy lives to go and share the efforts of the League with different community organizations and groups. Thank you to everyone who stepped up and were our voice in the community. Because of your efforts, I am proud to report that we have 29 new members this year!

However, this year has also had its challenges. We know that our work is not done. Election after election continues to be characterized by bitter partisanship and unnecessary divisiveness, the fair, balanced, nonpartisan voice of the League is needed more than ever. But, our local League continues to have trouble making ends meet financially and we are constantly in a position of making tough choices on the services that we are able to provide. Put simply, we are stretched thin.

You received a letter earlier this year about donations to our operating fund. With the conversion of our organization to a complete 501-C-3, this non-tax-deductible type of donation, will no longer be necessary. I do ask you, though, to remember the League, when deciding where to make your tax-deductible donations. With your help we can continue our mission of encouraging active, informed participation in government and influencing public policy through education and advocacy. I know that together, we can meet these challenges head on. Thank you for allowing me to serve as your president this past year. Onward and upward!

New President Speech to LWV Tarrant County on 5/15/2018 – Leslee Barnes



Since I don't know all of you, I thought I would take a moment to tell you a little bit about myself.

I was born and raised in Lubbock Texas. My father was a welder. He met my mom here in Fort Worth which is where she was born and raised.

My husband and I moved here in 2003 after graduating from Wayland Baptist University out in Plainview, TX and it is a plain view. I began my career in education teaching secondary social studies, everything from World Geography, World History to US History over 14 years. During that time I was able to work on and graduate with a Master's in Curriculum and Instruction which is the department that I work in at Aledo ISD.

We came to the Metroplex so that my husband could continue his education. His goal a PhD in New Testament which he now has from TCU's Brite Divinity School, so they own us. We have four-year-old twins, Lily and Marshall, It keep us on our toes. So when you see me smiling it's just because I'm deliriously tired.

I really love Fort Worth. It has that big city, small town feel to it. I like that it is the kind of place that you can get to know people and also have all of the cultural amenities.

How did I find out about the League? I went to the Texas Council for Social Studies Annual Conference and I saw two women, Edie Jones and Georgia Kidwell. They had these suffragette hats on that said "vote". Intrigued, I approached them and they asked if I was registered to vote? I giggled inside "but of course I am." What I really wanted to know is who they were and what this organization was that they represented. So they explained details about the League and I made a mental note that this organization stands for true political representation and to go sign up. It would be another two months before I had spring break and could sign up. I walked straight into the office and there was Doris. She was clearly surprised that I had walked in instead of signing up online but I had questions. And she sat there and answered every one of them that day. And then within a month Nancy Stevens called me and asked would you like to be on the board? To which I said "of course I would." And now here I am.

I was thinking about goals for this coming year and all the work that needs to be done, I remembered a book that is entitled "Lies My Teacher Told Me.

Here is one that I've actually told my students each year. In 1920, all women gained the right to vote. And I would say it and I would smile. I would wear it as a badge of honor. Some states allowed women the right to vote before 1920 in part because women were doing the same type of work that men were doing in the West. It just made sense to those communities to grant women voting rights. But it wasn't until 1924 that Native American women got the right to vote but in some states it took until 1962. It wasn't until 1943 that Asian American women got the right to vote. It wasn't until 1965 that more voting barriers were removed from Hispanic and African Americans. And in 1971, persons who were 18 became eligible to vote. All of these achievements took work. So that's it, right? We're done? Of course, we're not done. We have so much work to do. Right now, there is confusion and misinformation about the identification needed to vote. The courts are working gerrymanding cases all the time which are keeping communities from representation. And sure, more people came out to vote in this last primary than in years but that was only 16% of eligible voters. In many counties that favor one party more strongly over another the November election has already been determined by a small percentage of the population.

It is also our mission to make sure that voters that do show up to the ballot box are well-informed. I've been a part of putting together information for Vote411, which I use and I publicize. It's one of the most essential jobs that we do and we need to continue in this work but it is work that we must do together.

I look forward to our study of healthcare at JPS, and the state studies of human trafficking and the juvenile justice system that you'll continue to learn more about in unit meetings.

I look forward to having a new member's orientation since we have so many new faces.

We need to take recruitment opportunities when we can, in our everyday conversations.

On the wall in my office, I have a quote from Thomas Jefferson that I do believe in. He says, "I'm a great believer in luck and I believe the harder I work, the more I have of it." We have a lot of work to do. Who's going to do it, we are. And with a little bit of luck hopefully we can bring more representation to our little pocket of the world. I look forward to working with you and getting to know you this year. Eddie and Georgia, thank you for volunteering your time to be a voice for the League and roping me in.
