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

Dear Leaguers,

Walking in the Botanic Garden, biking on the Green Bay Trail, dining al fresco in downtown HP, summer concerts at Ravinia and the Garden, and relaxing with a good book: those aspirations are usually what's on our minds at this time of year. It's hard to stay in that summertime mindset while listening to the news of what's going on at the border, in Washington, in our oceans and lakes and worrying about children in detention camps and getting bitten by West Nile virus carrying mosquitoes in Highland Park.

Just as, this summer, I'm excluding walking and biking and concentrating on the less active pastimes that I can do, I'm also trying to focus on what I can do that may make a difference for others. I participated in the local *'Vigil to End Human Concentration Camps' – Families Belong Together* at Port Clinton on July 12. I hope some of you were able to make your voices heard at one of the many rallies and marches around the Chicago area for Immigrant and Family Rights. In Highland Park, some of our members are involved in establishing a local Curt's Café to provide life-skills and restaurant training to at-risk students in the Highland Park, North Chicago, Gurnee, and Waukegan. There are so many ways to make a difference.

As members of the League, we ourselves **educate**, **participate**, **and advocate** - as well as encourage others to do the same – in order to create a more perfect democracy. Through the League Education Fund, we work to turn citizens into educated, participating voters through our registration drives, candidate forums, voter guides and other projects.

It's been a busy spring. Since our last newsletter:

- Our Great Decisions Group has met three times to learn about and discuss critical global issues: the relationship of Mexico and the U.S. past and present; the rise of populism in Europe; and refugees and migration throughout the world.
- At our annual meeting and luncheon in May, Anita Banerji helped us understand the challenges threatening our democracy if we do not have a fair and accurate 2020 census count (page 3).
- On July 10th at the Immigration Program, we heard about some actual close-to-home immigration cases and learned the basics and history of immigration legislation in the United States from Lake Forest College lecturer and immigration attorney, Magdalena Wilk (page 6).
- The highlight of the spring for Carole Kohn, Nancy Goldberg, and me was the privilege of serving as your delegates to the League of Women Voters of Illinois biennial convention in Champaign (page 8). All three of us continue to be impressed by the passion and dedication of the women involved in the league.
- It was super fun for Leaguers to participate in the Highland Park 4th of July Parade again this year. We were delighted to hear the cheers from the spectators as we drove our royal blue convertible through the crowds. (Thank you, Judy Zimmerman.)

The Leadership Team wants to say "thank you" to everyone who has engaged with the League recently, in whatever way. You make a difference. We are also so appreciative to the staff and board of Highland Park and Highwood libraries for their collaboration in allowing us to use their facilities and promoting our programs. Thank you, too, to the City Council of Highland Park for their recognition of the role of the League in Illinois' ratification of the 19th Amendment, giving women the right to vote 100 years ago. Congratulations to our member Stuart Senescu who was also recognized by City Council for organizing the historic bike tour of Highland Park in honor of the city's 150th anniversary.



IMMIGRATION SERIES

First League Program

In the Immigration Series was a Big Success!

Magda presented an explanation of the kinds of proceedings she works on, such as family-based immigration, humanitarian immigration (such as asylum and programs for domestic violence victims), nationalization, and removal defense. She noted that backlogs have plagued the relevant agencies for years, but clearly have gotten worse. Thus, an applicant for asylum who passes the initial screening now may be given an immigration court date in 2021. In reflecting on the current situation, she noted that about twice as many people overstay their visas each year than the number who cross the southern border.

After giving us an overview of the status and prospects of many current immigrants, she discussed the broad overview of immigration law and policy in American history. The country has moved back and forth between welcoming some or many immigrants to more restrictive policies in general or restrictions on particular types of immigrants, particularly with regard to their countries of origin.

Magda's presentation was clear and useful and a wonderful overview of an area of law and policy that is not only controversial, but highly complex. We plan several more programs in this series, including one with a panel discussing matters of local relevance.









Annual Luncheon May 18, 2019

Planning FOR A Complete Count Census 2020.

On May 18, 2019, our League was expertly informed about the importance of completing Census 2020. Our speaker was Anita Banerji, Director of Forefront's Democracy Initiative, Census 2020 Outreach. She presented a strong message about encouraging the necessity for full participation in the Census. She focused on several salient points. The data from the Census drive the financial decisions planned by government bodies, businesses, nonprofits and philanthropy. Illinois could lose billions of dollars if its residents are undercounted. Outreach is needed in certain parts of the state that include counting low-income and rural families, young children, people of color and immigrants. To make people understand the importance of reporting and to help them feel safe, a variety of trusted religious groups and organizations should be available for needed explanations.

The Annual Meeting, held at Bella Via Restaurant in Highland Park, was an informative public meeting. If you missed it, join us next year for another great educational experience and a delicious lunch.












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91st Annual Business Meeting May 18, 2019

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT:

DIRECTIONS TO THE BOARD:

- Look into the benefit of our Newsletter being in the body of email, rather than as an attachment.
- Great Decisions: A question was presented regarding a varying fee structure for Great Decisions.
- Student Membership: A question was presented to explore a lower annual fee for students. Also discussed was clarification of membership tiers (regular, associate and student) with PMPs for each.
- Extend Voter Outreach: What is the possibility of adding Senior Centers and/or Nursing facilities.?

Bylaws were altered to conform to the LWVUS Bylaws stating that Membership is open to all persons at least 16 years of age. Discussion about membership fees for students will be researched.

MOTIONS:

- A motion was made and passed to review and update the School Referenda Criteria position (see below).
- A motion was made and passed to review and update the position on Boards and Commissions related to the change of nomenclature from commissions to advisory boards.
- A motion was made and passed regarding proposed City Planning action items. This involves keeping a watchful eye on:
 - On future CBD development.
 - The use of non-motorized means of transportation and planning of transportation and roads throughout the community. *The City Walk/Bike Program that was scheduled for last spring will take place this fall.*
 - Government acquisition, development or divestiture of public property (e.g. District 112 buildings.)
- A motion was made and passed to take action under our Environmental Preservation position as it applies to flood plain and watershed.

School Referenda Criteria:

At the Annual meeting the membership voted to update our local <u>School Referendum Criteria</u> position in anticipation of a referendum to rebuild the elementary schools in the next 3 - 5 years. This update will be conducted as a study, requiring a balance of members with a variety of viewpoints - opinions on all sides of any possible rewrite. It is of course reasonable to expect members to come with a variety of opinions; those with strong views will be encouraged to put aside preconceived perceptions and make an effort to see all sides of the issue. Our School Referenda Criteria is included below.

The update will only go forward if we have a critical mass of interested Leaguers to commit to it. Interested in being part of the first study we have had in several years? Send <u>Barb Lippai</u> an email.



ON THE ROAD TO THE 19TH AMENDMENT

The 19th Amendment reads:

"The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex."

Our League, now in its 91st year, thanked the City and spoke about its mission to register and educate voters and advocate for issues.

In Celebration of

The 100th Anniversary of Illinois Being the First State to Ratify the 19th Amendment

WHEREAS, Illinois had long been at the forefront of the movement to provide women the right to vote; and

WHEREAS, in Illinois the first women's suffrage association was established in Earlville in LaSalle County in 1855, just seven years after the first women's rights convention in Seneca Falls, New York, which called for suffrage for women: and

WHEREAS, the first statewide suffrage organization, the Illinois Women Suffrage Association was established in 1869, becoming the Illinois Equal Suffrage Association in 1891; and

WHEREAS, also in 1891, Illinois enacted a law allowing women the right to vote for elective school offices; and

WHEREAS, in 1913 Illinois enacted the Presidential Suffrage bill which gave Illinois women the right to vote in federal and municipal elections, not otherwise restricted to men under the Illinois Constitution; and

WHEREAS, with the enactment of that law, Illinois became the first state east of the Mississippi River to give women such right to vote for President of the United States, and is credited with being a major positive influence in advancing the women's suffrage movement in the United States; and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 1919, the proposed 19th Amendment to the United States Constitution was passed by the United States Congress and sent to the states for ratification; and

WHEREAS, 100 years ago on June 10, 1919, Illinois became the first State to ratify the 19th Amendment;

WHEREAS, Illinois led the way for the necessary three-fourths of the States to ratify the 19th Amendment, which became part of the Constitution on August 26, 1920.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, NANCY R. ROTERING, Mayor of the City of Highland Park, do hereby proclaim June 10, 2019 as a day to celebrate women's right to vote and the important role Illinois played in achieving that right in the United States.

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF ILLINOIS

LWVIL 50th Biennium Convention, June 8—9, 2019

Three members of our leadership team – **Judy Miller**, **Nancy Goldberg**, and **Carole Kohn** – attended the 59th Biennium LWVIL 2019 Convention over the weekend of June 7-9, 2019, in Champaign Illinois. More than 135 delegates gathered with staff, visitors and volunteers to discuss key issues and engage in all things League. On Friday, June 7th, there was a series of interesting pre-convention workshops to attend. Convention business was transacted on Saturday and Sunday. Learning from a wide range of leaders from around the state about their varying approaches to many substantive and practical issues was fascinating.

On Friday, each of us attended three different pre-convention workshops:

- Developing and Maintaining an Effective League Board
- Creative Membership Activities
- #Trending #LWV
- Create, Foster & Sustain Partnerships in your Community
- Going from Studies, to Consensus, to Advocacy
- IL Count Me in 2020: Making the Case for a Fair and Accurate Census Count in Next Year
- Engaging and Educating Voters for 2020: Candidate Forums and Voter Guides
- Criminal Justice Reform: The Way Forward -- Research, Legislation, and League Advocacy
- Board Training: How to Read Financial Statements, Treasurers' Reports & Budgets

During the business section of the convention, participating Leagues overwhelmingly recommended retention of all current positions. Leagues assumed that the study to update the Criminal Justice position would be continued. The following Action Foci for the 2019-2021 Biennium were adopted:

- Affordable Housing
- Abolish Electoral College
- Environment
- Fiscal: Graduated Rate Income Tax
- Gun Violence Prevention
- Immigration
- Redistricting

In addition, by will of the convention, the following were also added to action foci:

- Use of the term "climate crisis" or "emergency climate action at all levels of government"; and
- Fair Count Census

Bylaws changes adopted by the convention included a provision authorizing the Board to authorize pilot program memberships at the state or local level of limited scope.

During this year's convention we welcomed special guest speaker, Anisa Tootla, Chief Operating Officer of LWV-US. She had a special conversation with LWVIL Executive Director, Audra Wilson, about the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion principle and practice that is central to the LWV's current and future success in engaging all individuals, households, communities, and policy makers in creating a more perfect democracy. They highly recommend reading the following books: *White Fragility* by Robin Diangelo and *Color of Law* by Richard Rothstein.





stroll to the Polls

Modeled after an award winning <u>LWV Naperville Stroll to the Polls program</u>, plans are underway, chaired by Shoshana Friedman and Judy Miller, to have our own Stroll to the Polls before the March 2020 Illinois Primary elections. Brainstorming meetings have been underway with Highland Park High School Social Studies Department Chair, Joseph Brysiewicz, Civics teachers, and Lesa Friedrich, Director of Student Activities.

The goal is to have students and league members go to "**Low Turnout**" precincts, to provide voters with nonpartisan information on the location of their polling places, the names of candidates and sources for their bios.

Highland Park High School has multiple Civics semester sessions and the Civics teachers want both Fall and Spring semester students to be involved in the program. The department wants the students to do as much of the planning as possible.

Following are just a few of the plans:

- Target Date is March 8, 2020.
- Maps will be created from precinct turn-out records.
- Chaperones (League Members and parents) will walk with the students while they knock on the doors.
- Internal publicity campaign to be launched to get the students excited about participating.
- External publicity campaign to be launched to alert the community and get doors to open.

Our HP/HWD Program Committee has created an outstanding program schedule and membership participation, as well as neighboring leagues' participation, has been increasing and drawing new members. Please spread the word to help us continue to grow. Men have been members of LWV since 1973 and compose 20% of our current membership roster. VOTER REGISTRATION UPDATE


Thanks to Linda Kirschbaum, Rheta Pickard, Shoshana Friedman and Debby Zirin for **registering 192 new voters** at the 5/20/19 event at Highland Park High School. Publicity by Lesa Friedrich, our contact at the school, helped generate long lines of enthusiastic students. We worked non-stop for over three hours while students waited patiently and we established a new LWVHP/HWD record.



And, the next election isn't until the March 17, 2020 primary!

Since 2016 our League has registered 743 new voters. We collaborated with other Lake County Leagues on May 1st at Cristo Rey High School in Waukegan, where another 47 voters were registered.

Note: Keep your eye out for info on National Voter Registration Day, this year it will take place on September 24th.
