- Publicize events through press releases.
- Ask local newspapers to insert your voters guide.

 Arrange to be a guest on a local talk show to discuss focused, nonpartisan election and voting topics.





Election Deadlines

Last day to*

Register to vote: Date TBA Update registration: Date TBA Request a mail ballot: Date TBA Vote by mail: Date TBA * Date application/ball ot must be received.

ID Required to Vote in Person in Texas

One of the following accepted:

Photo ID

Not expired more than 4 years ago

- Texas driver license
- Texas Election Identification Certificate
- Texas personal identification card
- Texas concealed handgun license
- U.S. military ID card with photo U.S. citizenship certificate with photo
- U.S. passport

If no photo ID, sign a simple form and present one of the following other documents:

- Voter registration card (valid)
- Certified birth certificate (original)
- Current utility bill
- Bank statement
- Government check
- Paycheck
- Or any other government document with voter's name and an address

Note

- Addresses on ID and voter
- registration need not match.
- Election officials/poll workers may not question you about voter ID issues.

Know who/what's on the ballot

- ✓ Voter registration card lists your candidate districts and precincts
- ✓ Review a sample ballot
- Study a voters quide
- ✓ Arrend a candidates forum

Know where to vote

- ✓ Early voting: Vote at any polling. place in your county
- ✓ Election Day: Vote at your precinct polling place (or county vote center if county vote centers in effect)

Vote at your convenience

- ✓ To avoid the crowds: Vote during early voting. Vote between 10-11:30 am or 1:30-3:30 pm
- ✓ Vote by mail if you are 65+, disabled, or absent from the county on all voting days
- ✓ Curbside voting available for persons with a disability

- ✓ Someone to assist you if you need.
