
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Restoring the Voting Rights Act will Strengthen Democracy

WASHINGTON – The League of Women Voters is proud to support H.R. 4, the Voting Rights Advancement Act (VRAA) which will restore sections of the Voting



Rights Act that the Supreme Court stripped in the Shelby County v. Holder decision in 2013. Today [2/27/2019] League of Women Voters CEO, **Virginia Kase** released the following statement in support of this critical bill:

The right to vote is a sacred pillar of our democracy, central to the mission of the League of Women Voters, and why we deeply support the Voting Rights Advancement Act (VRAA).

More than 50 years ago, we saw the most sweeping advancement to voting rights with the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which made racially discriminatory voting practices illegal. Since the court's decision in 2013, voters across the country have faced issues at the ballot box including unlawful purges, shortening of voting hours, and the closing of polling places in communities with large populations of voters of color.

With the introduction of this bill, it is time for Congress to update the Voting Rights Act and restore the vote for millions of disenfranchised voters.

The VRAA will strengthen our democracy by ensuring that race is not a factor in determining who has access to the ballot box. It is time to move forward with this bill, and the League of Women Voters implores all members of Congress to support this important legislation.

Advocacy Teach-in and Tune-up by Sharon Sorensen

LWVC invited Southern California Leagues to attend an Advocacy Teach-In & Tune-Up on Saturday, February 9th in Los Angeles. This highly informative presentation took a deep dive into the difference between being political and being partisan; emphasizing that critiquing is not partisanship and that we should hold elected officials accountable. As an example, the Schools & Communities First campaign states that the League and other organizations "have submitted a ballot measure to protect California from the Trump federal tax giveaway for millionaire, and corporate landowners like himself." It was explained that without naming politicians and using edgy words like "giveaway," the message is wishy washy and that depending on who your audience is, we should not be fearful of using bold language so our message reaches and moves people.

LWVC also provided an overview of the Advocacy Team who review bills before the California legislature and ballot initiatives before voters. The League only takes positions based on current program positions and/or on League principles. Positions are developed based on member study and consensus. The Advocacy Team plays a key role in influencing public policy in Sacramento, and all League members are invited to join! Newcomers are welcome to join the Advocacy Team through a process designed to train and provide resources, while connecting them with mentors to help develop skills and expertise. Chris Carson, LWV National President, also in attendance, stressed that the Advocacy Team provides the "there, there" that people are often looking for when joining voting or advocacy organizations, emphasizing, "NOBODY else does it like this!"

The legislative calendar goes from January through September, with most of the action starting in March and ending in August. Various Advocacy Team roles have been established to ensure a smooth and efficient process, maximum impact, and a satisfying volunteer experience. The roles include Legislative Analysts, who are the backbone of the team, and Position and Area Directors, who provide leadership, build the team, and ensure appropriate training and support, while managing and tracking the team and the status of legislative action.

After lunch we learned the steps involved in the legislative process through a fun, hands-on interactive exercise before getting into some of the nitty-gritty of bill analysis. LWVC is developing a set of online training modules that will replicate most of the information provided at the Teach-In; in the meantime, the LWVC Advocacy Dashboard houses many of the materials used.

LWVNOC Meets with Assemblywoman Sharon Quirk-Silva



Metropolitan Water District of Southern California by Kay Bruce

Six North Orange County Leaguers embarked on a two-day bus tour of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California under the direction of Director Linda Ackerman. The Metropolitan Water District is a consortium of 26 cities and water districts that provides drinking water to 19 million people in parts of Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego, Riverside, San Bernardino, and Ventura counties.

Our first stop was at the Diemer Treatment Plan in Yorba Linda where we saw water from both the Colorado River Aqueduct and the State Water Project. The plant has been retrofitted for ozone treatment.

A stop at the Salton Sea (the overflow of the Colorado River in 1903) which covers 365 square miles allowed us to see the largest population of migratory waterfowls outside of the Everglades. This water is 1.5 times saltier than the ocean.

We then ventured to the Copper Basin and the Whitsett Pumping Plant. This is the beginning of the Colorado River Aqueduct pumping plants that lift water over 1,600 feet to deliver it to Lake Mathews in Riverside County. The pumps are submerged; the water enters the plant about 15 feet below the surface of Lake Havasu.

Parker Dam, located below the junction of the Colorado and Bill William Rivers, is the world's deepest dam. Behind the dam is Lake Havasu covering 39 square miles.

The Colorado River Aqueduct (CRA) is a 242-mile system of aqueduct, tunnels and siphons. The tunnels vary from 338 feet to 18.3 miles, comprising 38 per cent of the aqueduct length. The CRA has about 63 miles of lined canal, approximately 55 feet wide at the top, and 20 feet wide at the bottom, and 11 feet deep at the center.

There were 34 guests on the tour with all meals, lodging, and transportation provided. The lecturers were excellent. Those attending were Ellen Ballard, Tom and Donnette Gilliman, Sherlan Neblett, Mal and Kay Bruce.
