Mueller Report Reveals Urgent Need for Election Security

WASHINGTON – President of the League of Women Voters of the United States **Chris Carson** issued the following statement in response to the Mueller report:

"The Special Counsel's report makes one thing crystal clear: a foreign government interfered in the 2016 presidential election. Congress must now take bold action to secure our elections systems from future attacks. To do so, Congress must have access to the full report and the underlying investigative documentation to understand the full scope of the attack.





"Congress has the power to strengthen our election security with modern requirements for political ads that create greater transparency in our elections. Voters have a right to know about foreign sponsors and funders of the campaign-related ads they see.

"The Special Counsel's report signals the need for immediate action to safeguard the integrity of our

elections. One solution is sitting in a Senate committee right now. The *For the People Act* includes provisions that would ensure transparency in political ads as well as funding for cybersecurity that will protect our elections.

"This report makes it clear: Congress should pass the *For the People Act* this year to ensure that 2020 campaigns are free from foreign influence and voters can cast their ballots with confidence. The American people must know who is attempting to sway their votes."

April's Lunch with League: Waste not; Want not

Our speaker was Rachel Otair, program manager at Waste Not OC. In her presentation at Lunch with League, she told a hugely uplifting story of how a local organization is solving a perplexing sociological problem, people who need food. Its model is now being studied and adopted across the country.

Forty per cent of all food produced in American is never eaten and simply goes to waste. Waste Not OC Coalition began in 2012 with a simple question: if we could capture all the food that is thrown away in Orange County, could we end hunger here? Since the answer seemed to be yes, the next question was how to do it. The basic outline in three steps is 1) redirect unwanted wholesome food to local pantries, 2) identify individuals impacted by food insecurity, and 3) connect these individuals to sources of food.

Currently there are 300,000 food insecure people living in Orange County. These are people who are undernourished and unsure of where their next meal will be found. There are over 200 separate food banks and pantries in the county that have been struggling to meet their needs.

Waste Not OC's brilliant contribution has been to organize these banks and pantries into a single coalition that collaborates with grocers, distributors, school districts, sports arenas, convention centers, hospitals, waste haulers, and other entities to reduce hunger and food waste by safely and cost effectively recovering unwanted wholesome food for

distribution to local pantries. Since its inception in 2012, Waste Not has made spectacular gains. In 2018 the Coalition provided 17,509,671.75 pounds of nutritious food or 14,591,393 meals. This is food that otherwise would have wound up in our landfills.

From food donors, to runners who pick up and deliver food, to kitchens where food is prepared for consumption or to pantries and banks for free distribution, everyone involved is trained in safe food handling protocols

called F R E S H: food recovery enhanced safety handling. Donors display the Waste Not logo with pride because the Waste Not brand continuously has maintained the highest quality. Donors have discovered that by donating left over food, they have learned how to reduce waste while earning valuable tax deductions for their donations.

2019 Point In Time Count

The Point In Time is a biennial count of people experiencing homelessness on a given point in time during the last 10 days of January. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires more than 400 Continuum of Care jurisdictions across the nation to complete the biennial unsheltered count and an annual sheltered count of all individuals experiencing homelessness in the community.

In Orange County, the 2019 Sheltered Point In Time Count took place the night of Tuesday, January 22, 2019, while the 2019 Unsheltered Point In Time Count taking place over two days, Wednesday, January 23 and Thursday, January 24, 2019. The count provides vital information that helps the County better understand homelessness in the community and guides the way the County and its partners respond to homelessness in Orange County.




