# Advocacy Action by Mary Fuhrman




Gloria Chun Hoo of the LWVC board has asked for our help in advocating for Assembly Constitutional Amendment 6, which would restore the right to vote to Californians on parole and would update provisions in the state election code. The League intends to contact all California state legislators to urge their support for this legislative initiative to amend the California Constitution.

Jan Urban from our league, who has been active in women prisoner outreach, will be joining with representatives from ACLU and Prisoners With Children to discuss the matter with Assemblywoman Sharon Quirk-Silva.

If ACA 6 qualifies for the ballot by enough votes, it could be on the March primary ballot.

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### Give Mother A Vote by Sue Fisher

Our climate is changing. However much some may try to deny or dismiss this, it is our reality. Storms are more powerful. Heat waves, droughts, and unusual rain patterns are increasing. Coastlines are eroding from flooding and the rising sea level. Several places around the world have already lost land (1).

The Caribbean islands of St. Kitts and Nevis have already lost about a quarter of their land mass since 1961. Ecuador has lost over 10 percent and Vietnam nearly 5. States with coastal areas in the United States continue to be threatened, especially Florida and New Jersey. California, with its long western shore, already has thousands of homes and communities at risk, with many more to follow. (2)

While the loss of homes is devastating, the effects of climate change are even greater when combined with its potential effects on crop production, an increase in the spread of disease, and the disproportionate effect on people who already face physical and economic disadvantages.

The denial of climate change and the accompanying refusal to engage in any meaningful actions to combat it at the federal level acutely threatens our future. Specifically, the lessening of environmental protections and the lack of support for science combine to push the importance of our environment into the background. Yet, threats to crops by increased drought and flooding, as well as threats to clean air and water should make environmental concern a priority.

Recent tax cuts only further the national debt and widen the wealth gap. While this gives short-term financial gains for some, it ignores the need for long-term climate-sensitive investments. Hardening the defenses of communities in fire or flood-prone areas or entirely relocating them is expensive and requires programs at the federal level to do so. Additionally, the most disaster-prone areas are often inhabited by impoverished people who lack the financial resources to move elsewhere or to take measures to improve their chances of survival.

We can change this, but it needs to happen now. Call your representatives to get climate change back on the national stage. Act locally to reduce your carbon footprint (3). Remind people that climate change is already affecting the way they live and that we need their vote to address this. Remind them, too, that short-sighted politicians will be long gone, but every generation after them will suffer the consequences unless we choose representatives now who will protect our future. Mother Nature is old and wise, so please, give her a vote.

# LWV SoCal Climate Change Forum

**Summary:** Forty members of the League of Women Voters gathered June 22 in Pasadena to unite for local and state action on climate change. The forum was hosted by the LWVC <u>Climate Change Task Force</u> and attended by members of ten local Leagues, primarily from the Los Angeles Basin.

We focused on four areas for action:

Carbon Drawdown using the ranked list of solutions for Hawken's book, <u>Drawdown</u>
 Climate Activism by partnering with organizers, media and particularly youth
 Moving to All Electric in cities with local sponsored events
 Transportation-Housing-Land Use by engaging with local groups and monitoring plans

**Resolved:** The participants unanimously agreed that we must work to assure climate questions are included in the upcoming Presidential debates at all levels. A similar forum for Northern California Leagues is planned for September in Sacramento, and a third in the San Diego area at a later date.



# How is Voting Changing?

The California Voter's Choice Act authorizes specified counties to conduct "Vote Center" elections, and Orange County is lucky to be one of them! Polling places are replaced by Vote Centers and vote by mail Ballot Drop Boxes. All registered voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot. They will have myriad choices to deliver their vote. Voters can simply mail it off; it needs no stamp. They may deliver it to one of the 110 secure Ballot Drop Boxes placed throughout the county. Or they may go to any of the Vote Centers in the county.

Any voter can go to whichever Vote Center is most convenient for them. Each center has a well-trained, professional, helpful staff that will answer any of your questions. The Vote Centers will be open for multiple days before the election. The services include:

- Register, update your address, or change your party
- Vote in-person or drop off your ballot
- Get a replacement ballot
- Receive language assistance
- Use accessible ballot making devices

The new system is more convenient, more efficient, and has increased security. Plus, it has the added benefit of being cost effective. It will save the state money. If you are interested in learning more about it, visit <u>ocvote.com</u>

# 2020 CENSUS: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

The Census is a count of every person living in the U.S. every 10 years. The count is mandated by Article 1, Section 2, of the U.S. Constitution to ensure residents in every state receive fair representation and resources.

### WHY IS THE 2020 CENSUS IMPORTANT?



It's about making sure every voice in your community is counted



It's about resources for your community (schools, free lunch programs, college grants, housing vouchers and more)



It's about fair representation in local, state and federal government

### HOW IS THE CENSUS DATA USED?



By law, U.S. Census data cannot be shared with immigration or law enforcement agencies



By law, U.S. Census data cannot be used to determine eligibility for government benefits



Census data is used to advocate for more resources for community members



Census data is used to inform public safety, and the building of new schools and hospitals



Census data is used to decide where to open companies and businesses, which creates jobs

### 2020 TIMELINE

### MARCH 12

Self-response begins with an invitation to respond online to the 2020 Census. (Some households will also receive paper questionnaires.)

### MARCH 16 - 24

A reminder letter will go out to those who have not responded

### MARCH 26 - APRIL 3

A second reminder postcard will be sent out

### **APRIL 1**

Census Day!

### **APRIL 8 - 16**

A reminder letter and paper questionnaire will be sent out to households who have not responded

### **APRIL 15 - JULY 31**

Non-response follow-up begins. Census-takers begin to visit homes through July

### **APRIL 20 - 27**

A final reminder postcard will be sent
