MARCH 10 The Pioneers by David McCullough, the Pulitzer Prize winning historian. (2019) 352 pages. It is the story of the U.S., which as a part of the Treaty of Paris was recognized by Great Britain as the new U.S.A., being ceded the land which comprised the Northwest Territory. Not the northwest you may be thinking of but the wilderness empire northwest of the Ohio River containing the future states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin. Included in the Northwest Ordinance, for exploration and settling of the area, were three remarkable conditions: freedom of religion, free universal education, and most importantly, the prohibition of slavery. The book is in great part told through the rare collection of diaries and letters of the key figures and begins in 1787. Very readable and most interesting! MAY 12 The Overstory Winner of the 2019 Pulitzer Prize in Fiction, this is a sweeping, impassioned work of activism and resistance that is also a stunning evocation of-and paean to-the natural world. From the roots to the crown and back to the seeds, Richard Powers' twelfth novel unfolds in concentric rings of interlocking fables that range from antebellum New York to the late twentieth-century Timber Wars of the Pacific Northwest and beyond. There is a world alongside ours—vast, slow, interconnected, resourceful, magnificently inventive, and almost invisible to us. Talking to Strangers by Malcolm Gladwell. (2019) 400 pages How did Fidel Castro fool the CIA for a generation? Why did Neville Chamberlain think he could trust Adolf Hitler? Why are campus sexual assaults on the rise? Do television sitcoms teach us something about the way we relate to each other that isn't true? While tackling these questions, Malcolm Gladwell was not solely writing a book for the page. He was also producing for the ear. Something is very wrong, Gladwell argues, with the tools and strategies we use to make sense of people we don't know. And because we don't know how to talk to strangers, we are inviting conflict and misunderstanding in ways that have a profound effect on our lives and our world. 
The Woman's Hour: The Great Fight to Win the Vote by Elaine Weiss 2018 434 pages. AUGUST 11 Nashville, 1920, Nashville, August 1920. Thirty-five states have ratified the Nineteenth Amendment, twelve have rejected or refused to vote, and one last state is needed. It all comes down to Tennessee, the moment of truth for the suffragists, after a seven-decade crusade. The suffragists face vicious opposition from politicians, clergy, corporations, and racists who don't want black women voting. And then there are the "Antis"—women who oppose their enfranchisement fearing suffrage will bring about the nation's moral collapse. It follows a handful of remarkable women who led their respective forces into battle and tells how American won their freedom and the opening campaign in the great 20th century battles for civil rights.

LWV Celebrates House Vote to Remove ERA Deadline by Sarah Courtney, LWVUS

On the eve of LWV's 100th Anniversary – a step towards Constitutional equality

WASHINGTON (2/13/2020) Today, the League of Women Voters president **Chris Carson** issued the following statement after the U.S. House of Representatives voted to advance the Equal Rights Amendment by removing the ratification deadline:

Tomorrow, the League of Women Voters turns 100 years old, and I can't think of a better birthday present than this clear progress towards a more equal democracy for women.

Today, we celebrate an important step forward in a long-awaited dream of Constitutional equality for women. Since the 1970s, the League of Women Voters has fought hard to see the ERA become part of our Constitution and guarantee the same freedoms for all of us.

The ERA will pave the way for further legislative progress towards gender equality and will allow the courts to closely scrutinize sex-based discrimination.

There is no deadline on equality.

We urge the Senate to follow the House and remove the deadline for the Equal Rights Amendment.


