That's the title of the League water forum scheduled for October 2 at Delta College, cosponsored by LWVSJC, LWV of Diablo Valley, and Delta's Innovation and Sustainability Committee (the Green Team).

Everyone says that water in California is a complicated issue. People can feel overwhelmed by the controversies they read and hear about. So we thought we would get down to some basic facts about local, regional, and statewide water issues. Just the facts. Where water comes from. Where it goes. How decisions about water are made. And how all that affects the pocketbooks of California's citizens.

Of course, no discussion of water will ever be completely unbiased because everyone talking about the subject has a perspective. But we're going to do our best to stick to the facts. And because we know that some facts will inevitably be omitted, we're going to invite a variety of organizations to have

	Proposal to Privatize Local Libraries
	The San Joaquin County Board of Supervisors and the Stockton City Council are seriously considering turning over all aspects of management and operations of the Stockton-San Joaquin County Public Library to a for- profit company.
	Many libraries around the country have tried privatization with poor outcomes. Particularly given the lean operation in our local library system, it is hard to imagine how a private company could profit without reducing the quality of staff, materials and programming.
	The League of Women Voters of California calls for public libraries to be funded by government but does not have a policy position opposing privatization of public library operations. However, the LWVC position on Public Libraries calls for
	 Provision of adequate professional and nonprofessional paid staff Consolidation of library functions or systems to achieve cost effectiveness that would not affect the quality of service.
	LWVSJC will be evaluating any city/county library privatization proposal with those criteria in mind.
	Contact your county supervisor to voice your views on the subject.
	On a related noted, at the national convention this past spring, LWVUS voted to do a study of privatization of public services. We will certainly want to participate in this study.
	Arguments for Single Payer Health Care
	The League believes that Single Payer is the best way to ensure that a basic level of quality health care at an affordable cost is available to all residents.
	Senator Mark Leno is carrying the Single Payer Bill (SB 810) this session. His office has prepared a very helpful Question & Answer document. Regardless of what happens with Single Payer this session, it's helpful to have some of this information.
	Some interesting points:
	 More Americans than Brits or Canadians are dissatisfied with their health care system. Study after study shows that Americans receive substandard care compared to other industrial nations – even when controlled for
