Farmington Hills co-sponsoring with the Council of Homeowner Associations on Thursday, October 17, Costick Center, 28600 W. 11 Mile Rd., Farmington Hills 48336. 7 pm: two candidates for Mayor for 2-year term; six candidates for City Council, vote for three for 4-year terms.

Voter Guides are Underway for Fall Elections

The LWVOA is currently preparing Voter Guides for the November 5, 2019 general election. The League's Voter Guides and VOTE411.org (an interactive, community specific online Voters' Guide) ask all certified candidates to provide information to voters in their own words. This gives Oakland County voters an easy way to compare candidate positions and priorities in local races where information can be difficult to find.

For the upcoming election, the League has sent invitations to more than 160 candidates in 52 city elections to submit responses to questions about their qualifications and priorities. In addition, Voter Guides and <u>VOTE411</u> will provide voters with information about 24 local proposals on the ballot. The deadline for receipt of candidate responses is September 20 and the goal is to have online Voter Guides available on or before September 25.

During last year's 2018 general election, more than 60,000 voters visited VOTE411.org to view guides available for races on ballots in Oakland County and more than 30,000 voters visited LWVOA.org to view individual Oakland County community guides.

100th Anniversary Celebration Event



Iron Jawed Angels is a 2004 film about the American women's suffrage movement during the 1910s. The film follows political activists Alice Paul (Hilary Swank) and Lucy Burns (Frances O'Connor) as they use peaceful and effective strategies, tactics, and dialogues to revolutionize the American feminist movement to grant women the right to vote.

Note: Theatre policy states that no persons 15 years of age or younger are allowed inside the premises after 6 pm unless accompanied by a parent or adult guardian.

Additionally, no one is allowed into an auditorium 15 minutes after the show start time.

Webinars Now Available On Demand


