What Is a Consensus Meeting?

A **consensus meeting** is a structured group discussion where League members come together to share perspectives on a specific issue that has been studied in depth. The goal isn't to vote or reach unanimous agreement—it's to gauge the "sense of the group" through dialogue and deliberation.

Why Are They Important?

- **Foundation for Action**: The League only takes action on issues after reaching consensus. This ensures that advocacy is grounded in member understanding and agreement.
- **Grassroots Engagement**: It empowers members at the local, state, and national levels to shape League positions.
- **Informed Dialogue**: Members review study materials, attend informational sessions, and then engage in discussion to explore all sides of an issue.

How Does It Work?

- Members receive background materials and fact sheets ahead of time.
- During the meeting, a facilitator guides the discussion.
- Instead of voting, the group explores questions and shares viewpoints.
- If there's substantial agreement, the League records a consensus position.
- If opinions are too divided or unclear, no consensus is reached.

What Makes It Unique?

Unlike a simple majority vote, consensus is about **collective understanding**, not just numbers. It's a nuanced process that values quality of discussion over quantity of participants. If you're new to the League, consensus meetings can feel a bit mysterious at first—but they're one of the most empowering ways members shape the League's voice.
