

Dear Leaguers,

Wow! It's been almost 3 months since our last newsletter and so much has happened. The last newsletter came out in November when we were so excited about our approaching "Gala". The Gala was everything we had hoped it would be and more. Read more about the Gala on page 3.

The momentum and excitement created by the Gala has continued through these gloomy, but not-too-cold (my opinion) winter days. We continue to join in celebrating the League's 100th anniversary and the centennial of the 19th amendment with the Illinois League, the U.S. League and our neighboring Lake Forest-Lake Bluff League. The most recent event was the Centennial Suffrage Film Festival with Lake Forest-Lake Bluff, which ended last weekend. Watching the three films at the HP and LF libraries was quite an education. I never realized the degree of hardship, and, in some cases, torture, endured by some courageous and determined women in their effort to achieve suffrage for women. The celebrations continue as we join with the League of Women Voters of Illinois (LWVIL) at the very hotel (Congress Plaza) in the very room (the Gold Room) on the same day (February 14) where the League was founded 100 years ago.

In addition to the Centennial events, other activities have kept Highland Park/Highwood Leaguers out of the cold. Our Book Club has convened twice since the last newsletter, in November and January. We also held two Great Decisions programs in partnership with the Library in January. Our most recent event was our members' <u>"Chat with Rick"</u> on January 30. Rick Heineman is an involved Highland Park resident and League member, who attends many meetings of our local public bodies, including the City, School Districts, and Park District. It was an enjoyable, casual discussion of the local scene which will help us in planning our local program, including studies, activities and/or action, for next year. Our annual program planning meeting is coming up in March.

You've probably seen mentions of "**Stroll to the Polls**" in past newsletters and perhaps, more recently, on flyers around downtown Highland Park and Highwood. It's the largest project I've ever been involved with the LWV-HP/HWD and it's fast approaching! Read more Stroll info on page 4. The "Stroll" has been very labor intensive for the Leadership Team, requiring many hours of communicating via meetings, emailing and calls with teachers, staff, police chiefs, social service workers, librarians, county employees and more. Our communications team has designed all marketing materials in-house. In addition, we have spent hours driving around neighborhoods, jotting notes, working with maps. We have become users of GIS (Geographical Information System tools). We are so excited to work in our community with Highland Park High School students. Besides human resources, this project has also been costly. Because of the funds raised at the Gala, we are able to make this huge effort to reach residents in Highwood and Highland Park, providing them with appropriate election information, encouraging them to register and vote. We thank our generous hosts, the Holzers, and donors. We are planning to continue our fundraising efforts (although on a smaller scale) in the future to expand the scope of our programming and

to be able to offer new categories of membership with lower fees to students and others.

I welcome your suggestions and comments and hope to see you soon.

LWV HOLDS A SUCCESSFUL GALA BENEFIT

Our League held a Gala Benefit on the evening of December 5th at the beautiful Highland Park home of Marci and Ron Holzer to celebrate the upcoming Centennial of the League's founding in 1920. The event was attended by more than 80 people who enjoyed magnificent surroundings, wonderful chamber music by the Highland Park Strings Trio, delicious food and drink and the opportunity to be photographed with a life-size image of "Susan B. Anthony." Lake Forest College Professor Zachary Cook spoke about the history of voting rights in the US. League of Women Voters of Illinois President, Allyson Haut, described the importance of the Leagues' Observers Corps which represents the public at government meetings.

It was so much fun to celebrate such a momentous occasion! The founding of The League of Women Voters of the United States took place at the Congress Hotel in Chicago in 1920 as the final push was underway to enact suffrage rights for women. Following a 72-year struggle, League began as a "mighty political experiment." Part of the initial mission of the League was to help twenty million women fulfill their new responsibilities as voters.

The Holzer residence was beautifully decorated, both inside and out, to mark this milestone. In fact, the hostess selected purple and gold décor, the colors of the US women's suffrage movement. The event was a huge success, raising funds that will be directed to increase the League's community voter education.

"Stroll to the Polls" = YOUR VOTE IS YOUR VOICE!!

After almost a year in the planning, "Stroll to the Polls" is only a few weeks away. Inspired by our meetings with the Naperville League in April of 2019 and ongoing conversations and emails with the Arlington Heights League, the Stroll event is in its final days of planning and action.



Students of Highland Park High School, prepared by the Civics Department, along with League members and community volunteers, will join together to encourage residents of Highland Park and Highwood to vote in the March 17th primary elections.

Sunday, March 8th is the **Big Event**, starting with a rally at 10 AM at the Highland Park High School. Students will pick up bags, donated by First Bank of Highland Park, filled with voter information and routes. Students and adult monitors will then board buses to travel to their assigned walking areas.

After completing their routes, the students return, via bus, to the High School for pizza, music and concluding remarks by officials of Highland Park and Highwood.

As the concepts of individual participation in the electoral process are being taught in Civics classes, excitement is building and students are signing up for the big event. We hope to have upwards of 140 students plus about 60 teachers and volunteers engaged in this community-wide effort encouraging voter turn-out.

A significant number of League members joined our "Chat With Rick" (Heineman) program on the evening of January 30th. Rick is a Highland Park resident and League member who is active in the community and attends a lot of public meetings of governmental bodies. Prior to undertaking our annual program planning in March 2020, where we will decide what issues we want to prioritize for study, activities, or action in the coming year, we wanted a chance to talk informally about some of what is going on in the community. Rick's knowledge and thoughts provided a good starting point.

We primarily discussed issues relevant to the City, NSSD 112 and District 113. This included such subjects as construction plans and other issues related to the Ravinia Fire Station, the Senior Center, the Library and Clavey Road; the ongoing construction by NSSD 112; and ongoing consideration of the needs of District 113. We discussed affordable housing, beach erosion, the legal requirements related to selling City or School property, various environmental issues, the needs of seniors, and the need for more public space for community meetings or events (such as League meetings!). There was conversation about the real estate market, the rental market, school academics, the business districts, and Highwood. And much more.

We are grateful to Rick for his contribution to a fascinating and informative discussion.


Terry Grossberg, Park District Commissioner announced the results at the start of a wonderful program, ending with the ultimate, always spectacular, Jesse White Tumblers.

Update on League Candidate Forums

Local Leagues have public Candidate Forums when at least two people are running for the same office.

At this time the incumbent for the 10th Congressional District has decided not to debate a write-in candidate. The incumbent for the Illinois State Senate 29th District has no opposition and there is no election scheduled for the Illinois House of Representatives 58th District.

Our League has Candidate Forums for municipal elections. Not on the ballot this time are elections for Mayor, City Council, School Districts 112 and 113, and, the Park District. These are scheduled for 2021.

Therefore, our local League will not be holding Candidate Forums ahead of the General Primary Election on March 17th, 2020.





Goodreads: In 1961, Sarah M. Broom's mother Ivory Mae bought a shotgun house in the then-promising neighborhood of New Orleans East and built her world inside of it. It was the height of the Space Race and the neighborhood was home to a major NASA plant--the postwar optimism seemed assured. Widowed, Ivory Mae remarried Sarah's father Simon Broom; their combined family would eventually number twelve children. But after Simon died, six months after Sarah's birth, the Yellow House would become Ivory Mae's thirteenth and most unruly child.

This book is a 2019 National Book Award Winner; named a Notable Book of the Year by the New York Times Book Review; Named one of the "10 Best Books of 2019" by the New York Times Book Review, Seattle Times, Chicago Public Library, the Chicago Tribune and Slate.

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF LAKE COUNTY

The January LWV-LC meeting focused on:

- Program Planning Voter Registration
- Upcoming Candidate Forums (none planned)
- Criminal Justice meeting with LC Sheriff
- LC Board Observer Corps LWVIL Issues Briefing

A lot of discussion focused on **Complete Census Count**; We need to publicize to raise awareness that it is important for everyone to respond to the nine questions on the short form. They will get a postcard first. It will have a web link (preferred), a phone number (many languages available on the phone), and a link to print out a paper form. People who do not respond will get a letter. Then, the enumerators will come to the homes of any stragglers. The responses will determine what is the official population of our communities, which is the basis for the number of Representatives in Congress and as a basis for allotting various federal monies.

The 9 questions on the census form are very basic demographic questions: who lives in the household; how they are related; their age, sex and race; whether they own or rent their house; and their phone number. There is no question about citizenship, political affiliation, banking information, or social security number. The answers are completely confidential under federal law.

ADVOCACY: LWV OF ILLINOIS

DEFEND DEMOCRACY: Educate, Empower and ADVOCATE

Last month, Virginia became the 38th state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA)– crossing the three-fourths threshold of support required of states for this amendment to become enshrined into law. But when the ERA passed Congress in 1972, lawmakers attached a



1977 ratification deadline to it, which they later extended to 1982. Earlier this month, the League of Women Voters of the United States sent a letter to the United States Congress urging them to remove the ratification deadline on the ERA. Contact our Representative, Brad Schneider, and ask him to vote Yes for H.J. Res. 79 and remove the ERA's ratification deadline so that the ERA becomes law.

Ask our State Representative, Bob Morgan, to support HB3624 Clean Energy Jobs Act (CEJA) that would put Illinois on a path to 100% renewable energy by 2050, cut carbon from the power sector by 2030, reduce the equivalent of 1 million gasoline and diesel powered vehicles from the road and create jobs and economic opportunity.

Did you know that many of League of Women Voters of Illinois local Leagues serve as poll watchers in their communities? As poll watchers, Leaguers serve as non-partisan official election observers with special credentials allowing them to watch the proceedings inside the polling place. Poll watchers serve as a valuable election monitoring function to ensure fair and secure elections. They are especially important during a close race or during a recount. What a great way to serve as a watchdog for democracy!

People Powered Fair Maps Campaign is a national redistricting campaign of the League of Women Voters focused on creating fair political maps nationwide. The Illinois League has joined the collaborative with Change Illinois and other organizations to get rid of partisan gerrymandering and create an independent commission to draw up Illinois' legislative districts. Did you know that many 17 year olds can vote in the upcoming primary elections in Illinois? Illinois law allows 17 year olds to vote in the primary election if they will be 18 years old by the general election on November 3, 2020. Everyone who is eligible should vote in the crucial upcoming 2020 primary elections!

WOMEN'S HISTORY

Adeline Lobdell Atwater, born in 1887 and raised in Chicago, was educated at local seminaries and briefly at the Art Institute of Chicago. Mrs. Atwater, a member of the Highland Park Woman's Club and president of the Woman's Auxiliary at Highland Park Hospital, represented Illinois on the National Women's Party's National Advisory Council as the vote on the 19th Amendment

approached in 1919. The Woman's Civic Club of Ravinia (renamed the Ravinia Woman's Club in 1928 and merged with the Highland Park Woman's Club in 1968) was not idle:

"The Woman's Civic Club of Ravinia, Ill., being in favor of full suffrage for the women of Illinois as speedily as possible, therefore favor the adoption of an amendment to the Constitution to that end, and also endorse a Constitutional Convention for many reasons," it resolved in 1916. Both the Highland Park and Ravinia Woman's Clubs affiliated with the General Federation of Women's Clubs in 1900 and 1914, respectively.
