



Introducing ... Habitat Highland Park!



Sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Highland Park-Highwood and Go Green Highland Park, an exciting new program is now emerging for

residents and neighbors to help earn National Wildlife Certification (NWF) of our town as a *Community* Wildlife Habitat.

The NWF has offered a program for several years to encourage residents to work together and/or individually to provide safe and healthy habitats for insects, pollinators, butterflies, and birds in a collective effort to strengthen local biodiversity at all levels and reverse the alarming decline in pollinators in the US. Did you know that while American bumblebees were once common in open prairies, grasslands and urban areas across most of the United States, they have experienced a rapid and severe decline? Over the past 20 years, the American bumblebee has disappeared or become very rare in 16 states; overall, observations of the bee have **declined by nearly 90**%!

Why is this important? Bees and other pollinators carry pollen from plant to plant, fertilizing the production of fruits, seeds, and plants to support the crops and wildlife all around us. Because of the increased use of insecticides such as neonicotinoids used commonly on crops to kill plant pests, the populations of these critical members of the food chain are on the verge of being named to the Endangered Species list by the US Fish and Wildlife Service.

But we can help to reverse this perilous decline by creating welcoming havens for local wildlife right in our own back yards, on the grounds of houses of worship and school, or even on our apartment balconies. Habitat Highland Park is working with the City of Highland Park, the Park District of Highland Park, city schools, and other organizations to build a community of habitat supporters. Watch this site for information on new demonstration pollinator gardens that will be implemented this spring and summer, access to native plant sales, information on how to convert a corner of your yard or your balcony to a pollinator-friendly environment, and much more.


You can get started on your own today if your yard or balcony already offers these 4 elements to support wildlife health: food, water (can be a little bird bath!), safety, and places to raise young. As the NWF states,

Every habitat garden is a step toward replenishing resources for wildlife such as bees, butterflies, birds, and amphibians—both locally and along migratory corridors. By adding pollinator-friendly and monarch-friendly plants when you certify, your garden also counts toward the Million Pollinator Garden Challenge, an initiative to mobilize and educate millions of Americans about the need to plant sustainable pollinator garden habitats.

Openlands Lakeshore Preserve

For three days in early December, experts from five states convened at Openlands Lakeshore Preserve in Highland Park to conduct field work on a portion of the site in support of the investigation that stemmed from the discovery of explosives during the spring of 2021.


In support of Openlands, the Navy awarded a contract to Tetra Tech on September 24, 2021 to study the Openlands Lakeshore Preserve to address concerns to public health and safety. The Tetra Tech team will review the findings of the site investigation as well as historical documents to determine a recommended path forward.

The results of the study will allow for recommendations regarding the need for any further action, if any, and will also allow Openlands to make informed decisions regarding steps needed to re-open the Preserve. Public access and ecological management have been restricted since April 2021 due to the presence of military artifacts that were found on the property.

Openlands Lakeshore Preserve is located on the former Fort Sheridan, adjacent to Navy housing, with shoreline and bluffs overlooking Lake Michigan. The former Army post was closed in 1993 as part of the Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) process and a portion of the former installation was transferred to Openlands and converted to a nature preserve in 2007.

Naval Station Great Lakes, the City of Highland Park, Lake County, and Openlands have been hosting a weekly subject matter expert and leadership meeting to discuss efforts underway to support the return of public access and land management to Openlands Lakeshore Preserve. The team is committed to addressing concerns to return the preserve to its intended purpose as a nature preserve for the public's enjoyment and ask all to respect the closure while work is completed.





Sad News about the passing of Barbara O'Connell, a long-time LWV HP-HWD Member







LWVHP/HWD BOOK CLUB


Our Book Club continues meeting over Zoom the last Tuesday afternoon of each month.

LWV STATE AND NATIONAL ISSUES

All levels of the League continue to fight attacks on voter empowerment. LWV-US has responded to the limiting of voter registration forms and restrictions on mail-in ballots in Texas, the gerrymandering of districts in Maryland, the new law in Florida reducing the number ballot drop boxes, increasing requirements for mail-in voting and voter registration drives. You can read about some of these actions and statements at lwv.org/newsroom.

As was reported in the January LWVIL News You Can Use, advocates from the League acted in support of many laws that were successfully passed by the Illinois General Assembly this year. These included the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act, HB1871 (funded and provided for curb-side voting and secure mail-in ballot collection boxes), the Community and Emergency Services and Supports Act and the Youth Health and Safety Act (which repealed the Parental Notification of Abortion Act).

Governor Pritzker delivered his State/Budget FY23 address a few weeks ago and the LWVIL Fiscal Policy committee is asking Leaguers for our thoughts as to whether the budget meets our position: It must contain adequate revenue, fairly raised, and it must avoid cuts to vital programs and services. LWVIL additionally looks for a diversified revenue system which principally relies on a combination of broad-based taxes and user fees, is equitable, progressive, stable, responsive and simple. The state Fiscal Policy and Criminal Justice committees share information and are open to any interested Leaguers.



Votes for Women Trail Markers honoring Women Suffragists in the Chicago Area

As part of the Centennial Celebration of the 19th Amendment, a **Votes for Women Trail** was established honoring suffragists across the United States. A national Votes for Women Trail Marker honoring **Grace Wilbur Trout** was dedicated this summer in front of her home in Oak Park. Mrs. Trout was president of the Illinois Equal Suffrage Association (IESA) from 1912 to 1920, and spearheaded the campaign for woman suffrage in the state. A marker honoring **Ida B. Wells**, the famous journalist and leading African American suffragist was dedicated next to the Alpha Suffrage House where she conducted meetings. Recently, a marker honoring **Catharine Waugh McCulloch**, a suffragist, women's rights activist, and attorney was dedicated in Evanston. Negotiations with the City of Chicago continue in an effort to erect a marker in front of or near the **Congress Hotel on Michigan Avenue** where the League of Women Voters was founded by the suffragists on February 14,1920. Altogether there are 250 women's suffrage sites across the country being recognized with a Trail Marker. https://ncwhs.org/votes-for-women-trail/about-the-trail/

American Women's Quarters Program

The **American Women quarters** program designates a series of <u>quarters</u> featuring notable women in U.S. history, commemorating the centennial of the Nineteenth Amendment. The US Mint will issue five designs each year from 2022 to 2025 for up to 20 total designs. A woman will be honored on the reverse side of each coin, based on her "contributions to the United States in a wide spectrum of accomplishments and fields, including but not limited to suffrage, civil rights, abolition, government, humanities, science, space, and arts.

Laura Gardin Fraser's portrait of George Washington, which she submitted in 1931, was selected as the new design on the obverse side of these quarters.

American Women's Quarters Program (cont.)

The first honorees in 2022 will be author/poet Maya Angelou and astronaut Sally Ride. Angelou is the first Black woman and Ride is the first LGBT person to appear on circulating US currency. The three other 2022 honorees are Wilma Mankiller, the first woman to be the Chief of the Cherokee Nation; Suffragist and school superintendent, Adelina Otero-Warren, the first Hispanic American to appear on US currency; and the film star, Anna May Wong, the first Asian American. https://www.npr.org/2021/10/07/1044023494/ maya-angelou-sally-ride-anna-may-wong-historical-women-guarters-us-mint.

Women's L Project

This is phenomenal! Mattel honors a Chicago suffragist with a Signature Inspiring Women Ida B. Wells Collector Doll

This "series pays tribute to incredible heroines of their time; courageous women who took risks, changed rules and paved the way for generations of girls to dream bigger than ever before. Despite being born into slavery in 1862, Ida B. Wells became a pioneering journalist and outspoken activist for civil rights and women's suffrage. She co-owned and edited a Memphis newspaper where she courageously wrote about inequality affecting African-Americans. In addition, Wells (later known as Wells-Barnett) co-founded the National Association of Colored Women's Clubs and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). Sculpted to her likeness and wearing a traditional blue dress with lace details, this collectible Barbie doll honors Ida B. Wells' courageous activism and remarkable accomplishments." GREEN NOTES

Clothes Drying and Micro-Plastic Fibers ...



Some surprising new and old facts about your clothes dryer may encourage you to turn it off.....sometimes.

A new study has confirmed that dryers are a main source of microfiber pollution as they release thousands of micro-plastic fibers into the air after every use. That is to the tune of 120 million micro-plastic fibers annually from one dryer. These micro-plastic fibers contribute to our weekly ingestion of plastics which is now reported as enough to make a plastic credit card every week.

Clothes dryers are probably the most energy intense appliances most homes own. Air drying clothes has the potential to reduce the average household's carbon footprint by 2,400 pounds per year. https://ethicalunicorn.com. Using dryers more conservatively will also add to the longevity of your clothes while saving money in energy use.

Besides these savings, drying clothes in the sun provides a natural antibacterial protection, and some natural bleaching for those whites. Drying clothes indoors is a boon to your humidity during winter months. According to OVO, a UK green energy supplier, if every household in the UK with a tumble dryer, dried their clothes outside during the summer, they would collectively save more than \$242 million (converted from pounds) per year.

No doubts, less use of the clothes dryer is a good thing, so consider reducing your load.
