### message from the president

As we begin 2024, it is worth reflecting on all that the League of Women Voters of Bucks County achieved over the last 12 months. The following chart summarizes our activities.

Our Voter Service activities included 17 registration events. We also provided 30 senior residences with packets for registering their new residents, as well as information about completing mail-in ballots.

Our Voters Guide for the 2023 Primary and Municipal Elections included 232 races with 372 candidates. This guide, published online at Vote411.org, was accessed by nearly 7000 Bucks County residents, and distributed through the Bucks County Herald (via 25,000 print copies, and tens of thousands online consumers across the county).

Despite valiant efforts by our Candidate Forum committee, we were unable to convince any candidates to participate in live candidate forums. We did conduct recorded interviews with five of the ten candidates running for the Central Bucks School Board.

### PENNSYLVANIA'S FUNDING FORMULA FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

You may not have heard of the Basic Education Funding Commission, but it will have a huge impact on the future of public education in PA.

As a retired educator, I feel particularly involved in the future of education. As the parent of a son who graduated from local public schools, I am invested in the quality of our schools. As a senior citizen, I am very concerned about the future for today's young people.

My son benefited from a well-funded public school system. In Pennsylvania, this is a constitutional right. Every child deserves qualified instructors, up to date materials, safe and well-maintained school buildings. These are just some of the requirements our school systems need to prepare our young people to be successful as adults.

In Pennsylvania, funding for public schools is largely dependent on local real estate taxes. This is because Pennsylvania's state expenditure on public schools is among the lowest in the country. (See this info from the LWVPH on the spending.)



The previous funding formula was very unbalanced. For over two decades, the discrepancy between well-funded schools (in communities with high property taxes) and underfunded schools (in communities with lower tax bases) grew larger each year. Finally, a law suit was brought against the State of PA challenging this formula and its effects on school districts across the state. The previous formula was found to be unconstitutional, and a committee was charged with revamping the funding of PA public schools.

Right now, in Harrisburg, a new formula is being created by this committee of legislators and appointed citizens. Public comments on the formula are being accepted until Jan 11. Please take advantage of this opportunity to have your voice heard in this process. You can <u>submit your comments here</u>.

Let's start a new chapter for PA public schools where each child, regardless of zip code, can have a quality public education.
